He began by showing that Japan had a corporate existence, centuries before the birth of Christ, that the Royal family of Japan was the oldest in the world, and pointed out parallels to the early history of Britain and Europe while yet the Roman Empire held sway. A species of Feudalism grew up in Japan after centuries of worship of the Emperor as the Son of Heaven, and this held sway till 1603, though before this internal strife comparable to the Fnglish "Wars of the Roses" prepared the way for ad-

In 1603 a great leader arose who took the title of Shogun, and the body of men, who under him ruled in the name
