### Evening Meeting of F. Institute.

[By an overlook the copy for the evening meeting reached us before the day meeting, which came too late for this week.—Ed.]

Notwithstanding the bad state of the roads, before the time for starting the hall was full to the door. It was the unanimous wish of the meeting that Mr. Robt Reuwick take the chair for the evening. Mr Reuwick, in taking the chair, spoke of the many advantages the young men of to-day had over those of some days ago. He compared the machinery of to-day, to that of the swing of the old turkey wing or muley cradle. He also thought the Institute meetings might be improved upon by farmers bringing seed grain there, and having discussion on it; he also thought the women might bring their bread and pies and have them sold. Mr Wm Ramage was then called upon for a song, entitled the "Brave Old Guard" and being loudly cheered gave another old favorite, "The March of the Woods."

The chairman then introduced the first speaker, Mr Warren, of Aetou, who spoke on the subject, "How to Make the Institute a Success." First, by having a first class Sec. and Pres., then you want a lot of good, active, energetic directors, who ought to have at least the promising of the farmers' interests and calling. He also spoke of the great value of the seed grain fair and the fat stock show at Guelph, and advised all who could to attend these fairs as there was much to be learned at them. He also advised every young man and woman that could spare the time to go down to Guelph for a session which did not cost much, when compared with what you receive, and all that could not get down should attend all the Institute meetings that he could.

Miss A Hunter and Miss E Renton gave a solo which was heartily enjoyed. Miss Kate Dixon, Sec of Ladies Institute, gave a very appropriate recitation, followed by a short address as an encore, and giving the standing of the Ladies' Inst. and the benefits to be derived from a membership therein. Cool and collected on the platform, sociable and jolly with a wealth of good humor of it, makes Kate an ideal sec., and a general favorite. The chairman now introduced the second speaker, Rev Mr Campbell, who spoke briefly and to the point. He referred to the great improvement in farmers' sons and daughters; he thought there was not much need for the Ladies' Inst. here, as he had been around a good deal and could vouch for the good cooking in this community. (A voice from the audience, "You get the best.") He also gave his experience in growing carrots and advised selecting a plot where a church shed had been erected about 17 years, as a very suitable place whereon to grow carrots.

Next followed a duet, "The Army and Navy," by Messrs Ramage and Lothian.

The chairman then introduced the speaker of the evening, Dr Reid, V. R. of Georgetown, on the subject, "A Talk to Young Men." Mr Reid thought every young man should have an aim in life and one of the actuating aims of almost all young men was that of how to accumulate wealth. He compared commercial life to that of farm life. He advised young men not to be carried away with the reports of large salaries in towns and cities as men who work for salaries and are dependent on them, even if their salaries are large, don't make money fast; 8 out of 10 live up to their income. He used statistics to show that out of every hundred who tried other professions, only 5 were successful. He urged farmers to keep books as not one out of every fifty knew how much it cost to keep them. The young man when he comes to middle age ought to have something past him. As farmers we ought to be proud of our calling, as the money that is made on the farm is added to the nation. He used an illustration: take a doctor, he comes to you when you are sick, attends to you faithfully, restores you to health and then charges you \$50 for his services. You pay him and do not think it too much. The doctor is \$50 richer and you are that much poorer. But take a farmer who makes \$50 or \$500 on the farm, no one is one cent poorer and the nation is just that amount richer. Mr Reid strongly advised the young men to stick to the farm and if they were ambitious and were satisfied with a reasonable competency they would be sure to get it on the farm. In other professions statistics showed one in every five were successful.
