The Foreign Silver Nuisance.

The proposition which the Canadian Bankers' Association have made to the Dominion Government looking to the alleviation of the United States silver nuisance is one that will readily commend itself to the good judgment of the business men of Canada. It is, in brief, that the Government should arrange for the banks to take United States silver from the public, reimbursing the banks for the charges on shipping it out of the country, the banks to take at the same time from the Government an equivalent amount in Canadian silver. Under such an arrangement the silver circulation of our country would be quickly relieved of a large proportion of its foreign coin at comparatively trifling expense, and an immediate demand would be created for the product of our new Canadian mint on every dollar of which it must be remembered, our Government will make a profit of nearly fifty cents.—Industrial Canada.

North-West Legislation.

Public meetings of many kinds, public men of all shades of opinion have put themselves on record and we shall see before long what course our representatives in parliament will take.

Premier Haultain, of the Territories, has addressed an open letter to Sir Wilfrid, which may be supposed to voice the sentiment of the West. He is firmly of the opinion that there should have been only one Province seeing they have been working along together for many years harmoniously, and one province would very nearly save half of Legislative expense. He is opposed also to the plan of receiving subsidies from the Dominion treasury in place of Provincial control of lands, but on both of these points he feels less strongly than on the burning question of Education.

To graft on the new provinces a Separate School System, over which they have no control, is, Mr. Haultain thinks, showing a want of faith in the people of the new provinces which they don't deserve. The supporters of the eleven separate schools in the territories now were making no complaint, in fact they seem to have been well satisfied and in no way alarmed that the change in status from a territory to a province would work to their injury.

The arguments in Mr. Haultain's temperate letter are echoed with more or less vehemence in every province of the Dominion except Quebec. We think the whole question of Education, as we have said before, should be left to the provinces. We are not concerned at the present time to argue for or against Separate Schools, but the question of provincial control of a clearly provincial question will not down till reasons stronger than any yet advanced are forthcoming.

The duty of the hour is not to become excited. Some villainous, firebrand talk has already taken place. Some most discreditable cartoons have appeared, especially in the Toronto News. To jump at conclusions, to assign unworthy motives, is ever easy, but at present the attitude should be to weigh and to wait till the whole subject is discussed in parliament.

The people of Quebec and of the other provinces should try to change places and look at the question through the spectacles of those who differ from them, and by so doing a solution will be found creditable to this country, which should ever frown down all attempts to array race against race or creed against creed.

The School Question at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, March 7th, 1905. TO THE EDITOR OF THE REVIEW.

DEAR SIR,—As you will readily believe, the subject of greatest interest and the one most discussed about the "House" in these days is the School Clause of the bills to grant autonomy to the proposed new provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta. There has been a keen interest and some excitement and no one yet appears to know what course will be adopted. Some Reform members from Ontario will support the Government in the matter what they do propose but you would perhaps be surprised, and certainly would be pleased, to know how many Reform representatives from the banner province are strongly determined to do in the matter what they believe to be fair, right, honorable and patriotic, with justice to majorities and minorities, regardless of what may be the results, politically, either to themselves or to the party to which they belong.

The tension, and feeling of excitement and uncertainty is very greatly tempered and relieved by the great confidence that exists everywhere in Sir Wilfrid Laurier. His followers have unbounded faith in him and do not believe that he will entertain even a desire, let alone an intention, to do any wrong or inflict any injustice to or upon either a majority or a minority, in the North, West Territories or elsewhere. It is felt that it would be a gross injustice and a mean thing to hastily attribute hypocrisy, unfairness, cowardice, lack of patriotism or enslavement to any power to one who throughout his whole public life, as, for instance, in connection with the Manitoba school question, has shown and proved himself to be so bold, so courageous, so thoroughly independent of any undue influence, and in the truest and best sense, an honorable man, a good citizen and an able statesman.

Upon the present occasion, even though at first sight the Premier's opinions may seem to differ from our opinions, and perhaps be distasteful to our prejudices (and who of us are free from prejudice?) we will, I believe, all be willing to wait until we have studied the whole question as he has doubtless studied it, and will wait for his further explanations and interpretations before we will arrive at any hasty and perhaps unjust conclusions or allow ourselves to become unduly excited. An excited man is seldom a wise man.

No matter how our opinions may differ, and while we each have a right to an honest expression of our thought, whatever it may be, and to exercise our influence, be it great or little, on the side of what we believe to be right, I am sure that all good Canadians will deprecate any attempt to, for the sake of mere party advantage, stir up any strife or passion of race or creed in connection with the present legislation.
