Rarely has a town been moved to such a degree as "Olselev was on Saturday when it was learned that Mr. A. M. Dargavel had passed away that morning from the effects of the accident that happened to him on Thursday afternoon. It appears he was riding a horse, of which he apparently lost control, and when opposite the Leland Hotel he was thrown violently against the sidewalk. He was at once picked up and carried to a bed in the hotel, and the best of medical aid was soon in attendance. But all that could be done was of no avail, his internal injuries being of too serious a nature and he expired about six o'clock Saturday morning, leaving a widow and seven children to mourn his loss. Deceased came to the west from Durham, Ont. about the year 1897 and has always been well and favorably known during his residence here. At the time of his death he was proprietor of a livery business in town and manager at this point for the Western Packing Co. His age was a few days short of 46 years. Deceased being a member of the Masonic Order, the lodges at Grenfell and Sintaletta took charge of the funeral arrangements, and the funeral on Monday afternoon was by far the largest in the history of the town. All business was suspended at noon and blinds drawn and remained so until nearly 5 o'clock. Then follows a lengthy description of the procession to the church, four of the clergy walking, band playing the Dead March, two lodges of Masons about one hundred strong, immediate relatives and a long line of vehicles and citizens on foot. Service over a similar procession took place to the grave, where, after the church service he was given a Masonic funeral. The casket was covered with many beautiful floral designs, and on all sides were many indications of genuine sorrow.
