Captain Johnston, of the Parisian, testified that he obtained a captain's certificate in 1874, and had held the position of captain for thirty-one years, This was his first voyage on the Parisian. He had been going to sea for forty When off Halifax harbor, near the automatic buoy, on Saturday afternoon last, Winnipeg, April 3. - Considerable he saw a pilot boat. The steamer slowstarboard bow. The most interesting witness of the day was Rev. Dr. Kirkpatrick, Cambridge professor, who positively asserted that the German steamer was to blame for the collision. He had amusement by stating that Captain Johnston shouted from the bridge to cal language, but the captain of the Albano did not make a reply.
