### TOLERATION

The average layman who finds it difficult to follow the lawyers in Parliament through the constitutional arguments involved in the Northwest school controversy cannot do better than procure Hansard copies of the recent speeches of Sir Wm Mulock and Mr Fielding who dealt with the subject from the standpoint of religious toleration.

Sir William at the outset expounded the constitutional issues in a manner that brings them within the comprehension of all; but principally devoted himself to pleading for a keener realization on the part of most of us of the necessity, in a mixed community like this, for a large and liberal tolerance of the opinions, religions and other wise, of those belonging to a different race or creed. He spoke in appropriate language of the duplicity of certain Conservatives—some firing the Protestant heart of Ontario while others headed by the Jacques Cartier Club of Montreal are urging the Roman Catholics of Quebec to insist that the Education clause of the Autonomy bills does not do justice to the interests of their church. He also made a happy reference to the position of Mr Foster, who, when the Manitoba school question was being dealt with by the Administration of which he was a member in 1896, took the ground that the Separate School compact of 1867 applies not to Ontario and Quebec alone but to all the other provinces, whereas as an opposition representative of the Protestant city of Toronto he is now apparently arguing to the contrary.

But Sir William rose to a loftier plane when he appealed to our sense of tolerance and fair play. Having secured the simplest constitutional protection for their brethren of the minority in the Province of Quebec. Protestants are scarcely justified in seeking to overthrow the protection afforded to the Roman Catholic minorities elsewhere. Such a course is not in accordance with the golden rule, doing as it would be done by, nor, as he observed, it is of a piece with the policy of England in treating the different races and different creeds found in the Empire; and, finally, it is not a line of action calculated to ensure to Canada that peace and concord which are essential if she is to enjoy her full measure of material well being.—Com.

Frank Oliver Succeeds Sifton.

Unusual interest has been aroused over the appointment of Frank Oliver of Edmonton, to the very important office of Minister of the Interior. The election takes place about May 2. The following appreciative sketch is from the Globe: "Few men living know more about Western Canada than Mr Frank Oliver, the newly appointed minister of the Interior. He is a pioneer of the pioneers. He settled at Edmonton and began the publication of The Bulletin at a time when it would have been difficult to imagine where a sufficient number of subscribers could have drummed up to keep it alive. It was long famous as the smallest newspaper published in Canada and typographically the neatest. It is now a daily. Mr Oliver's faith never altered, though subjected to trials that might have daunted a less dogged man. When he began the publication of his newspaper he threw in his lot permanently with the country and both have flourished, though the struggle was a long and to most men would have been a discouraging one. He is of the material of which Ministers of the Interior should be made. He is familiar with the problems that confront the builders of the West. He has shown his faith in it as the home of men and his faith has been triumphantly justified. Mr Oliver has industry and firmness and a clear and logical understanding, and it may be prophesied that he will fill the office with general approval."

### The War.

A new situation takes the attention this week. The Baltic fleet which left home about 5 months ago, fired on some North Sea fishermen in passing, steamed through the Gibraltar Straits and the Suez Canal, and lingered at Madagascar for a month or two, has turned up in the China Sea. It has crossed the Indian Ocean, sailed through the Straits of Malacca, past Singapore and is heading north and north-east, no doubt with the aim of joining with the Vladivostok squadron.

Where is Togo? Not known for sure, but almost certainly in some sure position to strike hard and swift. St. Petersburg strategists think Rojstvensky has outwitted him. The latter sent some colliers and small ships, some hundred miles away to one of the many straits in the East Indies, quite ostentatiously, and by so doing put Togo off the scent, allowing the Russian main fleet to get through the narrow strait of Malacca and past Singapore without a shot. Togo now has the Baltic fleet to the south of him, Vladivostok fleet on the north, and his fate between two fires is risky and uncertain. This is the St. Petersburg view.

But other strategists say Togo has them just where he wants them, the Russians, owing to barnacles on their ships are slow sailers, while Togo's are in splendid shape, and though he has only four battle ships to the Russians' seven his superiority in cruisers and torpedo boats and the "wine of victory" more than makes up. In any event a great naval battle is expected soon, one that may astonish the world and prove the greatest struggle of modern times.

Not much comes to light of the doings in Manchuria. Linerists, who took Kuropatkin's place, has won no victory and suffered no great defeat. The Japs are planning to capture both Harbin and Vladivostok and they have proved that they plan not in vain. Weather and roads are at their worst for marches and movements.

Peace seems yet in the far distance, for the Japs are planning to have a million men in the field in the fall.

The war is a great teacher of geography. We will all be able to pass an examination on eastern Asia by the time Togo and Rojstvensky have settled their little differences.
