### TOPICS OF THE WEEK

—The Railway Commission has caused joy to farmers and cattle dealers by securing for them much reduced cattle rates to the seaboard. Hitherto the main line charge from Sarnia to Prescott was 25 cts, ignoring distance, now there is to be a graded system, which reduces the rate gradually from 25 to 19 cts. Branch lines gain too. Palmerston is reduced from 27 to 25 c.

—The Intercolonial Railway is to be extended from Montreal to the great lakes, running rights having been secured over the Canada Atlantic to Depot Harbour on Georgian Bay. This will help the grain-growers in the West and anything that helps them is a national gain. Should get running rights over the G. T. E. to Toronto also and be a connecting link between the Maritime provinces and old Ontario.

—Mr Ames, Conservative M. P. for a Montreal division, and a member of the Protestant Committee of Public Instruction of Quebec, is going to support the Antonomy bill, "not through fear at any portion of his electorate, but through a spirit of justice."

### LETTERS to the EDITOR

Mr Editor,

Kindly permit me through the columns of the Review to offer some remarks in regard to the Furniture Co. By-Law on which we are going to vote this week. When the amount of \$10000 bonus and \$10000 loan was first mentioned it seemed to me a large amount, and felt inclined to vote against it but after looking carefully over the by-law have come to the following conclusions. First, let us take the bonus of \$10000 this means the turning over to the Co of \$10000 received from the Insurance Co's fund, would not mean any more taxation to the ratepayers for at least five or six years as we have been levying rates for the payment of the interest of this by-law since the factory was first built. Then about the time the delinquency of this by-law (that is the first Furniture By-Law) fell due, the payments on the consolidated by-law expires so that with an extension of a further ten years the rate at any time would not be heavier than at present.

Second, the loan of \$10000 means simply the payment of the interest on the loan for ten years amounting to \$2175. If we deduct from this amount \$750 or \$800 of school taxes which we will receive during the ten years if the factory is rebuilt it will only mean about \$1300 in ten years or an average of \$130 yearly which would be less than 1/2 mill annually or less than 50 cts per year on \$100 of assessment. After the loan is paid we would then receive full taxes from the Co or at least \$150 yearly. Then again as was pointed out in the "Chronicle" last week it will mean more houses and more people in the Town and a much higher assessment to levy rates on if the Factory is rebuilt. Also I understand the Co intends to increase the men employed in the factory and this would necessarily mean a payment of \$2000 in wages every month. Again I understand that if the Factory is rebuilt another industry to employ 15 or 20 men is likely to start in connection with it.

Another note worthy fact and to my mind perhaps one of the most important is that the furniture manufactured by the Co has a first class reputation and commands ready sale, and the Co has now an experienced management and would not have to encounter the losses which occurred during the first year.

For these reasons I intend to cast my vote in favor of the By-Law and trust we may carry it almost unanimously believing that there will not be any material increase in the taxes. I want to see the old town boom along as it has been doing the last five or six years and it occurs to me that about the first thing that ever started the town to go ahead was the Factory.
