

TELLER PERRY ARRESTED. Second Official of the Bank of Yarmouth Now in Custody.

Halifax, April 17 .- Following the arrest last week of Cashier T. W. Johns of the suspended Bank of Yarmouth, General Manager Stavert of the Bank of Nova Scotia, who was appointed by the Dominion Government curator of the suspended bank, caused a warrant to be issued for the arrest to-day of William H. Perry, formerly teller of the Bank of Yarmouth, who, it is alleged, was short in his cash.
