TOPICS OF THE WEEK

—Flaring full page advertisements in Toronto papers show that a land boom is on in Winnipeg, which will no doubt furnish a few prizes and many blanks to those induced to speculate.

—A gift of \$10,000,000 by Andrew Carnegie to provide annuities for college professors who are not able to continue in active service, was announced today by Frank A Vanderlip, Vice-President of the National City Bank of New York. Professors in the United States, Canada and Newfoundland will share in the distribution of the income of the fund.

United States Steel Corporation five per cent mortgage bonds for \$10,000,000 have been transferred to a board of trustees and steps will be taken at once to organize a corporation to receive the donation. Dr Pritchett, President of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and Mr Vanderlip, have been selected by Mr Carnegie to obtain data on the subject to be presented at the first meeting of the trustees which will take place on November 15.

—Peel License Commissioners have reduced the License in their county from 25 to 16, and have abolished the only shop license.

—The teamsters strike in Chicago is assuming tragic proportions. The employers have a teaming organization of their own, non-union men of course and many of them imported these go through the streets with loaded rifles across their knees and there may be some deadly work before long.

—The woes of Warsaw might fill a big book. On May 1, a day always anxiously awaited in labour circles, a clash took place between strikers and the military, with the result that about 100 are dead and wounded and not a few of them women. The strikers placed women in front of them and the soldiery seemed to have lost all control. Russia is the largest empire in the world, but it is safe saying that it has the lowest happy spots of any.

Exchange Echoes

An unmarried preacher in a neighboring town, who was young and new to the harness, was leading a service at a young folks' meeting "Oh, Lord, he preacht, with fervent eloquence, 'give us all clean hearts, pure hearts, humble hearts, sweet hearts.' A titter went around the congregation, but the girls all responded "Amen."

CONFLICT OF AUTHORITY.—Some time ago Mr. E. E. Houghan asked the town council for permission to cut down a tree near his stable. The council would not grant the permission, but since that time the Mayor told Mr Houghan to go ahead and cut it down and he would fix it all right with the council, or words to that effect. Constable Russel laid a complaint against Mr Houghan before the Police Magistrate.—Bruce Herald.

An advertisement in a daily paper states that 300 teachers will be required in the North-West. This gives some idea of the demand there is for teachers and shows why so many Ontario teachers are going west. At present Ontario 1st and 2nd class certificates are recognised anywhere in the west, and as the west will not be able to supply its own teachers for some time, these certificates will likely be recognised for a good while before the prairie province feel disposed to "protect" its native teaching industry. With the rapid development of the west will follow a continuous demand for teachers, so that the day of extremely low salaries is over.

The Toronto Star makes rather a good point when it says that editors of The Globe, The News, The World, The Telegram, and Saturday night, all of which journals oppose the school clauses of the autonomy bills, some of them frantically, themselves do not send their children to the Public Schools, but to private schools. Separate schools established for social reasons are even more objectionable than those established for religious reasons, and there would be vigorous opposition to their receiving state aid, but we would hardly forbid the establishment of class schools as long as they are wholly supported by their patrons, who also contribute to the support of the national schools.—Confed.
