JOHN KNOX.—Next Sunday is the 40th anniversary of the birth of John Knox, and all Presbyterian churches will make reference to the great Reformer. Rev. Mr. Farquharson on Sunday morning will present the life and work of this great man. OWEN SOUND, May 15.—Rev. Robert Rodgers, for over half a century a prominent minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, died on Saturday in his 87th year. [Students of the Collegiate Institute back in the 80's will remember as we do, the kindly, faithful pastor.—Ed.] Anniversary Services will be conducted in St. Columba Church, Pricerville on Sabbath May 21st at 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. Rev. J. H. Edmison, B. A., Cheltenham, will preach at both services. On the following Monday at 8 p. m. a Stereopticon Entertainment will be given by Rev. C. T. Cocking late of Japan, who will also lecture on that country. Scenes, Views, events, including some of those pertaining to the present war, will be reproduced. All welcome. A bill of considerable interest to farmers has been introduced in the Legislature. It reads as follows:—It shall be the duty of the owner of every heifer, steer or bull under one year of age to remove the horns of such animals and any owner neglecting to comply with the provisions of this section shall be liable on summary conviction thereof to a fine not exceeding \$10, in the case of any animal with regard to which such neglect is proven together with the costs of conviction and The Ontario Summary Convictions Act shall apply to every prosecution under this section. Railway Time Table changes should be noted by travellers. The morning train leaves here at 7.30, five minutes earlier than usual. The afternoon train leaves as usual at 3 and incoming trains arrive at 10.30 a. m., 1.40 p. m. and 8.45 p. m., the latter 15 minutes later than before. A notable improvement has taken place in facilities for reaching London. The morning train from that city reaches Palmerston in time for our morning train, so that passengers and mail from London will reach here two or two and a half hours before those from Toronto. Similar changes render it easier and swifter to get to London. An agent of the London Free Press was in town Tuesday in the interests of his paper, and with commendable enterprise they are expressing their paper until such time as the mails are arranged. BOUGHT A MANSE.—The Presbyterian Congregation was hastily called together on Monday forenoon last by an announcement at the services the day previous, to consider the advisability of purchasing the Parker residence for a manse, a definite offer of \$2000 having been made to the committee. Quite a number gathered earlier and went to have a look at the property, and were kindly shown by Mr. Sheppard over the house from cellar to attic. There were no two opinions of the admirable site and general excellence of the house and grounds, and an equal unanimity seemed to prevail that the price and the hour had arrived to "make a deal" for certainly the saving in time, worry and expense in buying rather than in building was most evident. At the congregational meeting which, though not large was representative, a motion prevailed to empower the committee to secure it at once and the necessary steps taken to secure the sanction of the Presbytery to the new obligations the congregation is taking upon itself. Already 10 members have been found who will give a handsome contribution to the fund and the spirit of "oneness" prevailing make it certain this strong congregation will make short work of the balance, and feel pleased besides that with other town congregations, and every other Presbyterian charge in the Presbytery they have now a comfortable manse of their own, though not as central as might have been wished. It was only on Saturday the offer was made and it had to be accepted by Monday at noon hence the urgency of the meeting.

HAPPY CANADA.—We have a few features in Canadian weather we could dispense with, but not by way of barter for the cyclone features so common in the United States. A despatch from Lawton, Okla., on Monday says: "As a result of the tornado at Snyder, Okla., inhabitants of the 'New Country' in Oklahoma are digging 5000 tonrad collar. City officers and town boards are urging the construction of such caves, and some towns have passed ordinances, requiring the digging of caves. At Hinton, Okla., the following official notice has been published: On nights when clouds look at all dangerous, a sentry will be stationed in the bell tower, provided with a repeating shot gun. If there is apparent danger, he will ring the bell and fire a number of shots in quick succession. Also, any person who sees a storm coming when the sentry is not stationed will be expected to fire a gun."

C. P. R. The interest in the activity observable of late in surveying parties for the proposed cross country road through Durham has been added to by references in Toronto Star and Globe to the matter. The surveyors are again at the west end coming east locating finally the route. It is a matter of uncertainty yet which of the three trial routes through and east of this town will be chosen. The reference in the Globe says: "A number of surveying parties are at work locating a route from Walkerton to Flesherton, on the Owen Sound division of the C. P. R., and construction will commence very soon. Pricerville, Durham and Hanover, centre of a rich agriculture section of country, will be served by this branch." Spring Assizes. At the Spring Assizes this week two cases of some interest here will go before the jury. They are thus put out in the list of cases.— McDONALD vs. MCARDLE:—The parties in this action reside in the Township of Pricerville. The defendant during the Municipal Election in that township sent out a pamphlet to the electors in which among other things, he stated that the plaintiff who had been a Deputy Returning Officer the year before, had unlawfully given ballots to parties not entitled to them and otherwise misconducted the election and was liable to imprisonment.
