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TOPICS OF THE WEEK

-All reports from the West indicate a fine wheat prospect.

-Two Baltimore physicians think they have discovered a serum cure for typhoid fever. Trials on 23 cases resulted in recovery of 21, fifteen of which they think directly traceable to the effects of the serum.

-Commercial agents are being sent out of Vladivostok preparatory to a siege.

-Rumors are abroad that Rojstvenky has broken down nervously, but the Russian war office has no fear and expects him to be able to get to Vladivostok with some of his fleet when he will be retired as he is too irritable to get along with the commandant of the fort and generals there. This explains his silly and criminal action in the North Sea.

-A Conservative caucus at Ottawa has decided to oppose the two pending by-elections in London and N. Oxford which is not surprising news.

-Halifax and Esquimaux are to be kept in repair merely, the Admiralty thinking it unlikely they would ever form a part of a campaign area.

-Togo is maintaining an admirable secrecy as to the disposition of his fleet while it is certain he is kept in touch with that of his adversary. One of the weaknesses of the British Empire in war is the demand for every scrap of information by her people, which, of course, filters to the enemy. This was noticeable in the Boer War.

-A proposal has come up in the British House of Commons to have the West India Islands administered by the Dominion. Commercially this union should be the greatest advantage. The step taken by the J. B. McLean Publishing Co., in sending traveller John Cameron there may yet bear greater fruit.

-Hon. Mr. Whitney is to be congratulated on his firmness with the Radial Railway Co., who wanted something like a perpetual franchise in their charter. He took the unusual course of going to the committee to assure them the government would not endorse the bill even if recommended. The committee threw it out by 9 to 8, Beattie Nesbitt voting against the Government view. Mr. Whitney was also on commendable ground when he objected strongly to important measures being brought in in the closing hours of the session. He put another feather in his cap by the clever way he handled the Junction Pool room, a notorious gambling establishment which has been broken up and its leaders heavily fined.

-Hon. C. S. Hyman has been sworn in as Minister of Public Works in place of the late Hon. Jas. Sutherland. He will be keenly opposed in London.

Humiliating Tragedy.

A heart rending tragedy was enacted in Toronto on Friday last, and the hearts of thousands have been lacerated by the deliberate murder of a 9-month old baby by a 13 year old girl. Mrs. Murray was in front of Eaton's about 4 o'clock and left her go-cart with baby in it in a lane for a brief minute or two, when she came out both were gone! She notified the police, who were inclined to think at first it was a joke of some one, but time passing and no return, the distracted parents and others continued the hopeless search. Saturday afternoon the police were notified by two little girls, Josephine and Mand Carr, that they had found a dead body at the foot of a 90 foot embankment, and Josephine had seen a woman the day before wheeling along the embankment, and she described her dress so minutely that suspicion rested on the mother. Detective Forrest got them face to face but Josephine said Mrs. Murray was not the woman, and her readiness to give further information, aroused suspicion that she was lying and before three hours, she confessed herself the murderer and told all.

She wanted to steal the go-cart and took it, baby and all. She took a street-car, having the cart hung on behind, got off to wheel it home and became embarrassed what to do with the baby. With fearful deliberation she hung it over an embankment 90 feet high, crawled down and undressed it, carried the baby into a culvert where it might never have been discovered had not the workings of an immature intellect in an effort to deceive over-reached itself.

"Oh what a tangled web we weave When first we practice to deceive."

The girl's mother died two years ago, her father married again, but separated from his wife, and the girl was making shift as a housekeeper, but being the father's control. She has a bad reputation as a liar, and was a frequenter of low theatres and infuenced by the atrocities and murder scenes too often displayed on bill boards. Well may we say as the bereaved father said of the murderer of his babe "Poor Girl," but the question will not down, is the community doing all it can to surround youth with the best influences, and to prevent a contamination that leads to this deep depravity.

LATER-The revelations at the inquest add horror to the tale. It appears now the girl undressed the baby first then drowned it.
