

They interfere more effectually with the free entrance of air than anything else, and as they exist unseen they are often the unsuspected cause of a child's ill-health. If a child breathes with the mouth open and not through the nose, they are likely to be present. If there are many of these growths to give rise to catarrhal discharges from the nose, and they will also interfere with the hearing. They sometimes occasion the swelling of the glands of the neck and cause inflamation which results in open sores. Children suspected of having these growths should be taken to a surgeon to be examined. The main thing to be borne in mind is that the only proper way for a child to breathe is through the nose.
