Council met June 9th. Minutes sustained.

Ferguson—Gordon—re A. D. Clarke's communication—That this Council will be satisfied to have the matter decided by the T. P. Engineer under the Duties and Watercourse Act, and as Mr Robb is the aggrieved party we wait his further action in the matter. Carried.

McArthur—Ferguson—That clerk be instructed to write Proton Council asking for a conference to settle Towline expenditure for past five years and we appoint Comr. Robb as a committee to meet Proton Com. to adjust acc'ts at a date to be mutually agreed upon. Date to be fixed by Proton Council. Carried.

Gordon—Robb—That Jas. Myer's acc't of \$5.50 for taking Wm. Romanus to O. S. goal be paid. Carried.

Comr. Gordon reported on rep. 2 culverts amounting to \$4.50. Report adopted, order granted. Carried.

Reeve reported on consulting Wm. Kingston on legal matters. His opinion on Holstein sidewalk was submitted to Council. His opinion was to confirm Council of Cement Co. Durham and as R. Renwick's machinery is fixed, therefore it is exempt from taxation.

Report adopted, and \$5 be paid reeve for his services. Carried.

On motion—Council formed into a Court of Revision, Portland Cement Co. Durham appeal, not reduced, R. Renwick reduced \$800—Roll was finally passed Council resumed—James Mack, Secy. S. S. No 2 presented an application requesting the issuing of School Debentures amounting to \$1800, to erect a new School house in said section. It was examined the preliminary steps taken by the trustees and found the requirements of the law fully complied with and recommended their request.

By-law No 188 to issue Debentures for S. S. No 2 amounting to \$1800—passed usual readings

By-law No 189 to commute the Statute Labor in Dromore was also passed and signed.

Robb—Ferguson—That an appropriation of \$250.00 be made to each of the road divisions for general repairs other than bridges and culverts and large jobs of hill cutting, and the road divisions the same as last year. Carried.

Resolved that following acc'ts be paid—W. B. Sutton express charges 30 cts; C. A. Drum spikes \$1.16; J. E. Roland gravel 66 cts; Reeve distributing Patrolls 2 days \$6.00 clerk do. one day \$3.00 Clerk's quarter's salary \$38.75; Comr. Gordon half day securing operator for \$1.00.
