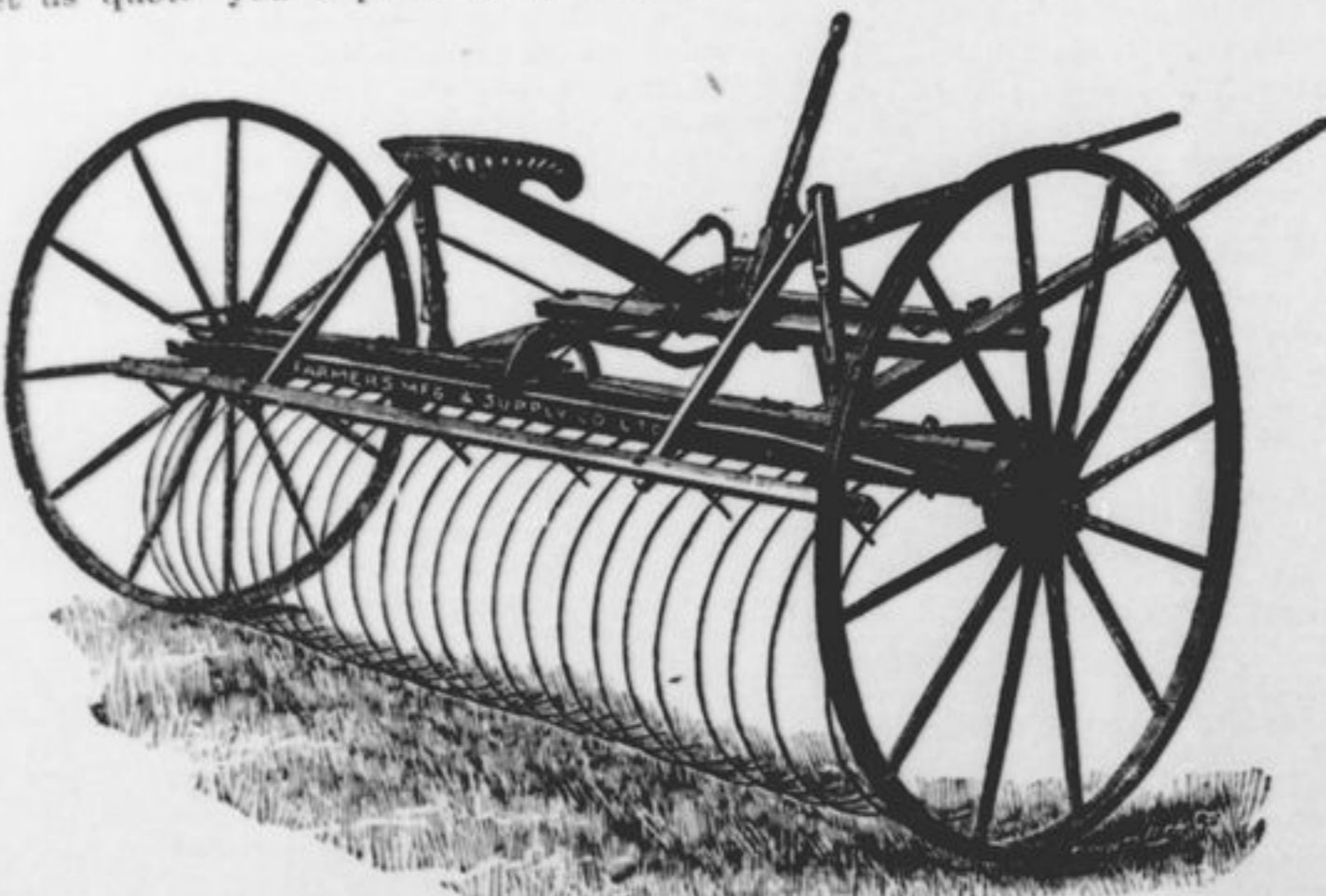

The brief period of military camp life is rapidly drawing to a close. Some of the members being perturbed on Tuesday by a foundationless rumour that Camp would be extended for another two weeks.

The feeling is somewhat inspiring as one quietly writes, to be suddenly startled by the loud boom of cannon in rapid succession, which jars one's whole system and echoes reverberates from grove to grove and helps to create an interest varying the monotony of the afternoon drill. It is most fortunate they are not loaded or it would be a most different feeling, a horse of a different color.

Hann and eggs are promised for breakfast to-morrow, liberal supplies of jam and butter are provided, and less cheese than formerly, lots of sugar notwithstanding the high price prevailing. Eggs are 20 cts per dozen here.

It is surprising why more don't come out to Camp from Durham and take advantage of the enjoyment to be found both in sight and sound, probably we are not constituted alike, but in our opinion, one afternoon's service of an adjoining property is ample recompense for any inconvenience we may be put to try for four or five miles and back, so magnificent and so inspiring, penetrating to one's inmost soul if he has one for it.

Most everyone took in the excursion to the falls but Corp. Thos. Moore, who already feels so early the inconvenience of office having had to act as Corp. of the quarter guard for that day. Needless to say his duties were performed faithfully and well. A holiday for him on Monday forenoon recompensed to a small extent for the disappointment.

The present drill is evidently ordered with a view to conforming to modern conditions of warfare such as sending out advanced parties other sections of the force coming up to their support. The weather of the last week was somewhat cooler than the first, the scouting exercises taking the men necessarily out in the common and among the trees where they obtained both air and shelter. On reaching home from Review there was a buzz of excitement to learn that we were to leave that night at 10.30 p. m., we were able to strike tent and clean up our lines, and got away a good hour ahead of the time called for only to have a very impatient wait until 5 minutes after one and finally getting to sleepy Hamilton at 1.30 a. m., leaving there at 8.30, and arriving in Durham at 2.15 earlier than we have ever yet done, rendered necessary by the fact of the large camp the Railways being unable to handle all the troops in the usual time.

So the Camp for 1905 is over, the largest and the best ever yet held amid beautiful weather and surroundings and leaving with a feeling of regret that it might probably be the last. If present intentions are adhered to.

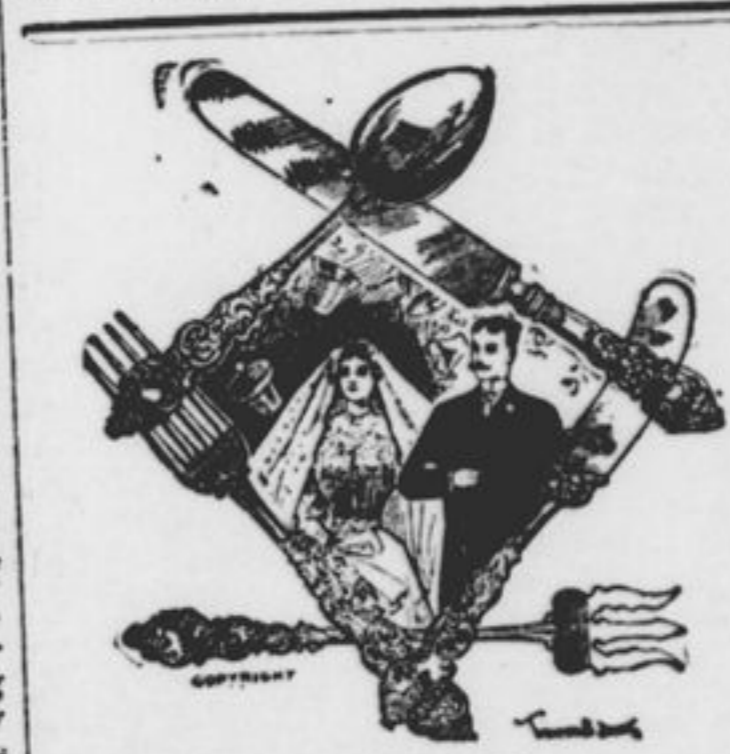
