#### ----About Old Clocks.

In an article on Old-Fashioned Time-Pieces in the August Defineator, N. Hudson Moore gives some facts of interest, among them being the following:

"The origin of the earliest timekeeping device is lost in antiquity, but among the first clocks composed of an assemblage of wheels of which there is no doubt, as to age, is the clock in St. Paul's Cathedral, London, which was put up in 1286. By 1600 there were clocks made for a moderate price and for the use of the average householder. These clocks were known by the name 'bird cage, 'lantern' and 'bed-post' clocks. They were put on shelves or brackets attached to the wall, and were wound by pulling down the opposite ends of ropes on which the weights were hung. 
