The Axe Falling.

Last Saturday's News had a long list of official changes of Division Court Clerks, Bailiffs, Inspectors, etc., showing plainly that the doctrine of the spoils to the victors is being followed.

Rumour had it last week that Inspector Harris had fallen but such was not the case, he and his neighbor inspectors in S. Bruce and E. Grey, being still on ever loosening roll of the old guard, now numbering about 10 only. The name of a prominent Glenelg farmer and of a well-known blacksmith are prominently mentioned for the Inspectorial position, with the chance favouring the former.

Meanwhile the Board and Inspector Harris go right on and on Tuesday last brought into force some new regulations which are expected to facilitate the enforcement of the law. These will be found in full in another column.

TOPICS OF THE WEEK

—On Aug. 12th the Russian people are promised a National Assembly, this being the first Anniversary of the birth of the Czaewitch. However as the slang phrase has it, the promise has a sting to it, for the Czar will have the right to prorogue or dissolve the Assembly. Wonder has the Czar studied the life of Chas I of England?

—The Argyle, an excursion steamer with about 150 Toronto excursionists ran aground in a fog near Whiteby. Great excitement followed of course, but happily no fatalities occurred. The fog lifted and passengers were transferred to another vessel in small boats.

—The Czar and M. de Witte, chief plenipotentiary, are talking bravely about no surrender for great Russia or conclusion of a peace dishonorable to her at the coming peace conference which meets in a few days. Japan will lose no advantage this month may bring, and is busy letting the world know she must have Harbin and Vladivostok first, the island of Saghalien, Port Arthur, and an indemnity of \$750,000,000. This, Japan says will preclude all idea of Russia posing as a Pacific state, and consequently she will be able to avoid ever fighting Russia again, something she earnestly desires.

—A new Alliance is being formed between Britain and Japan of a closer nature than the previous one. When completed its terms are to be made public.

—The meeting of the Kaiser and the Czar in the Baltic has set all heads guessing as to its purpose. One guess was that it was to get the Czar's consent to have one of the Kaiser's sons made King of Norway, but another of the latest and likeliest guesses is that the Kaiser wants support from the Czar to make the Baltic a closed sea to outside nations. That this is suspected in Britain seem certain by the unusual order to the Channel fleet to cruise in the Baltic. That this must be irritating to Germany cannot be doubted and is evidence that the British war office has knowledge of schemes afoot to work to the injury of Britain. If Germany were now to send a fleet to manoeuvre in the Irish Sea wonder if Britain would be angry? These "pin-pricks" of the nations of Europe will keep the age of peace long in the future.

—A corner in Wheat in Winnipeg! Something new in Canada. Anyway the price of this staple a few days ago ran up to \$1.30 a bushel and shipments of wheat for the first time on record were made from Eastern cities to Fort William for shipment west! Carrying coals to Newcastle: somebody will drop good money in the meantime.
