## Hopeville

Barn burnt by lightning—On Saturday 5th August, the barn of Geo Sturriek, 11 con, Proton, was struck by lightning about 2 o'clock and was instantly in a blaze. It was a first class frame with stone stable underneath and about 70 tons of hay and a lot of implements, machinery, etc. A thorough bred bull was got out of the stable, and there was a small insurance on building and contents. Mr McNinnis died about 30 years ago and Mrs McNinnis lived on the farm with her family until a few weeks before she died when she went to see her daughter where she got worse of her ailments and died. The funeral was on Friday the 11th to Priceville.
