The Late Mrs Blythe.

The Guelph Mercury of last Wednesday has the following extended notice of the death of Mrs Blythe, whose offspring are well known in South Grey:—Mrs Janet Blythe, of Marden, whose death occurred on Monday at the advanced age of 90 years, was a native of Inverness, Scotland, and a daughter of the late J. C. McDonald, C. She accompanied her parents to the LaGuayra district in South America, concerning which glowing promises were held out, but these and the settlers were reduced to a destitute condition. The British government came to their help and landed them in New York in 1827, whence they were sent on to the just opened settlement at Guelph, taking bush land on the Elora road between Guelph and Marden, which, through the labors of themselves and descendants, is now one of the best flourishing agricultural sections in the province. The McDonald family settled on a farm near Marden, and the property has since remained in the possession of the family, as grandson, Wm. Wald, now occupying it. Of those who settled with J. C. McDonald, only four are living. They are Angus Gill, Marden; Mrs Ferguson, who was a Miss Kennedy, and Duncan McCrea, Essex county. The deceased went to the old log school near where the C. P. R. station now stands, and, as a young man, was an active worker in the old St. Andrew's church on the Market Square, of which the late Rev. Jas. Smith was the pastor. In 1855 Janet McDonald was married to Alexander W. Blythe, and for thirty-seven years they lived happily together, a family grew up around them and one of the happiest homes it was and only broken up by the death of the father in 1872. Since that time the widow has lived with her son Alexander W. Blythe, Marden. There were six sons and three daughters' seven of whom survive. They were: Colin Blythe, of the township of Normanby, Grey County; Alexander W. Blythe, Marden; Robert Blythe, who died a few years ago; Joseph Blythe, Normanby, county Grey; late John Blythe, who was formerly member of the legislature for South Grey; Charles Blythe, Marden; Mrs John Ellis, Marden; Miss May Blythe, with her brother, Alexander W. Blythe, and Mrs Wm. Beattie, Fergus. Mrs Blythe had always been in good health and was a remarkable woman, both physically and mentally. With memory undimmed and naturally of a strong physical constitution, showing little evidence of the burden of years, she kept her faculties right up to the last; always retaining sympathetic interest for good old days and never happier than when recalling the stirring incidents of pioneer life. During the declining years of her life Mrs Blythe was seldom ill, and when the end did come it was sudden, yet very peaceful.

House of Refuge Notes.

An inmate of the House of Refuge writes a fluent pen and contributes interesting letters to the Standard which show a light on the institution not to be looked for from any other source. We give his last week's budget:

On Saturday last four inmates from the county jail at Owen Sound were admitted to the Home, one male and three females. Among the latter was old Mrs. Waterson, who a short time ago was transferred from this institution to the county jail as insane. We do not think the poor old creature will long be a trouble anywhere, as she is very old and apparently gradually sinking. Another of the old ladies is blind and the third is demented, though quiet and harmless, unless she becomes agitated; so says her former attendant. The man is strong looking and apparently under sixty years of age, but sadly demented, though harmless and quiet so far. His name is Lumley and claims a very close relationship to royalty, having innumerable nephews and cousins among the nobility of Peers, Viscounts, Marquises, etc.; is the possessor of large estates, a chest of gold, mortgages by the score, landlord of half of Markdale, with great expectations from scores of relations. Immediately after breakfast on Sunday he managed unobserved to slip away from the county jail as inmate, and returned in time for dinner. Notwithstanding the close watch kept on him, he managed the close morning (Monday) to elude all vigilance and again slipped off, no one knows where. What is to be done with these poor usanso inmates is a query which should meet with an early solution, it being quite possible that a number of similar cases will be dumped into the House of Refuge. If such is to be the case it will become absolutely necessary to erect a special building and employ a special staff, the present building is totally inadequate for the purposes for which it is used, viz., a Home for the deserving poor, an hospital for sick and helpless cripples, an asylum for the blind and lastly, a lunatic asylum. For the first named the institution was designed and so far has answered the purpose in all its requirements, but in either of the

three last named instances the institution is far below its requirements, nor can we think it was ever intended for such a combination. As to the insane ones, though apparently harmless, they are liable at any moment to become violent and do harm. Even if such should not be the case it is a well known fact that insanity is capable of forming many cunning devices to elude the vigilance of their keepers and make their escape from the institutions in which they are confined. To keep this class of inmates in reasonable and unchristian. How then are they to be kept within bounds? The answer must be embarrassing both to the Manager and the Matron, as nothing of the extra duties involved in the already over-tax staff. It is hoped that a re-adjustment of this institution as a system of conducting this institution at a House of Refuge will be consummated at an early date.

On Thursday last a considerable number of visitors registered. Some, however, were obliged to leave without being shown through the house, owing to the lateness of their arrival. Intending visitors should bear in mind that the house is closed to visitors at 4 p. m. and the hours in which the order imperative. The hours in which the house is open to the public is from 10 a. m. till 12 noon, and from 2 till 4 p. m. each Thursday.

On Sunday last divine service was ably conducted by Mr Morwood. The after service took the form of a most pleasant fellowship meeting. The next service room was full of inmates who on Sunday evening will assist the meeting by delivering a discourse on "Confession of Sin, a Duty."
