Steadily the country is developing, though the severe winter of 1903-04 and the high water in the spring des troyed many of the apple trees and scarcely left a wreck of the fine peach orchards that promised so fair.

The casual traveller is apt to think the crops this year worse than usual owing to the luxuriant weeds everywhere in evidence. I have to confess indeed to a little surprise when I was told that crops were away above the average. The weeds that had impressed me, I was assured were but the aftermath of a rich harvest.
