Alberta and Saskatchewan.

The Dominion of Canada now contains nine provinces, and a territory or two that may some day attain Provincial rank. The two latest additions to this happy family are the two new provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan, which on September 1 were duly supplied with the necessary outfit to enable them to rank as Provinces.

The great function of swearing in the Lieut. Governor was done by the governor-general, Lord Grey, in the name of the King, on Friday last in Edmonton, the first Lieut. Governor of the Province being Hon. G. H. Bulyea. The same ceremony was done for Saskatchewan on Monday in Regina, the new appointee there being A. E. Forget.

Very fittingly, the popular premier of the Dominion, Sir Wilfred Laurier, was there and marked the occasion by eloquent utterances. There were exhibitions of alibi nature, evolutions of mounted police, school children's processions numbering 2000, singing during the swearing-in ceremonies, "The Maple Leaf for Ever."

Accompanying Sir Wilfred were Hon Wm. Patterson and Sir Gilbert Parker, the noted Canadian literateur, now, a member of the British House of Commons. There were telegrams of congratulations from King Edward, the Colonial Secy., Lord Strathcona and others, and the great historic event has passed into history in the most successful manner.

## HIGHLAND BAND

One of the Several High-Class Attractions at the Western Fair.

After completing an extensive tour of the United States and Canada, the magnificent band of the 91st Highland Regiment has been secured to give concerts during the Western Fair.

That this enterprise on the part of the Fair management will be appreciated there can be no doubt. The band is composed of forty—one musicians, all masters on their respective instruments, and in every city of the United States where it played was accorded an ovation.

The ring attractions are of the usual high class. They include leaping the gap in a steam automobile by Mons. Breton, the only legitimate act of the kind in the world. Hardly, in some really thrilling high wire work: Rice and Elmer, expert horizontal bar performers; the five Bellatzer Sisters, well qualified gymnasts and acrobats; Wolfe and Milton, in a bounding billiard table act; the five Valdares, extraordinary bicyclists and unicyclists; Mullin and Correlli, premiers of acrobatic comedy; and Billie Andrus and his Mule Maud.

The fireworks will be the best ever attempted in London, and will give a graphic representation of the historic Battle of Copenhagen, in which the great Nelson gained so much honor and glory for the British navy.

## Lacrosse Notes.

The Intermediate C. L. A. championship goes to Bradford. Guelph was the scene of the final battle between Bradford and Seaford for the honors, and, by the score of 6 goals to 5, the Easterners won. Brown Jackson's aggression secured the only two goals in the first quarter and at three-quarter and full time, the score was a tie, five all. Thirty minutes extra time was ordered to be played and in 23 minutes Bradford notched the winner. This was as close a match as has been played in the C. L. A. finals.

The C. L. A. evidently did not consider Durham the most satisfactory town in which to play off the tie in this district for they picked upon Harrison, a town more given to baseball and very little known on the lacrosse field. By losing the game there to Mt. Forest, by three goals to two, Hanover forfeits their last chance of capturing other than this district.

By the Dundalk Herald's report, that Bradford-Shelburne match is a disgrace to the C. L. A. Shelburne team endangered Referee Wagborne's life, clubbed the Bradford twelve, and refused to leave the field when penalized. Pete Matheson of town was with Shelburne and played the cleanest game of any man on the team. The Chateworth Banner suggests grouping Shelburne with Owen Sound next year. They might furnish some exciting matches.
