Greatest Success Yet

Toronto's popular annual Exhibition opened in full swing Monday, Prince Louis of Battenburg pressing the button. Larger crowds than ever are in attendance this year, 40,000 being present Opening Day and an estimated attendance of 115,000 Labor Day. This figure will probably be exceeded to day, Wednesday. One of the chief drawing cards is the cheap railway rates, providing an enjoyable outing. The fair itself is well up to its former standards. Great attractions last week were Prince Louis of Battenburg and the 300 English Tars, while the Irish Guards band is on hand throughout the exhibition. The Process building is a very interesting and instructive one, and gives opportunities of witnessing the products of modern machinery. Ribbons, table covers, carpets and rugs are woven together from slender threads, a model bakery is in operation, new appliances for envelope making and printing are running at lightning speed, and in the manufacture of the Eaton shoe, one observes the steps taken in producing by up-to-date machinery, present day footwear. To see the cats and dogs an extra admission fee is charged, also for the famous Coronation picture, which however is well worth the price. The Art Gallery besides Canadian exhibits contains a splendid collection from England. Where the crowd congregates is in the Manufacturer's building which is the most attractive throughout, being tastefully displayed with exhibits of Toronto firms, and well advertised by the distribution of free circulars, pins, etc. To farmers and their wives the dairy building is a leader. Butter making contests are held on certain days, and under the same roof is the Cream Separator exhibit. Here near the entrance is the popular Oxford, made in town, and represented by Mr Frank Vickers. It compares favorably with any other in the building. The Midway is as strong a crowd attraction as ever and the glass blowers, the perfumed woman, the three legged calf, etc., continue to draw in the people—and the cash. A full grand stand every evening witnesses the stage performance. Some wonderful acrobatic stunts are pulled off by tall-priced experts, trained elephants give exhibitions, and the capture of Port Arthur by the Japs is interesting though probably not realistic. Fireworks, then street car jams, conclude the evening's program. The Exhibition Directors should net a handsome surplus this year, as with larger gate figures and a growing name and fame, it will in all probability be a record breaker.
