The Council met August 12th, pursuant to adjournment. All the members present, the Rev. in the chair, minutes of last meeting read and confirmed, communications read as follows, from the committee appointed to examine the Bridge at lot 47, con 3, north, reporting that steps had been taken to have a new bridge built, as they had considered that necessary; from the treasurer, statement of funds on hand; from Omas Tabbott and several others, gravel accounts from the several ward commissioners reports of expenditures.

Arrowsmith—McMillan That Colin McDougall, of Durham, be paid the sum of \$75 for painting the hall, also \$5 extra for border put on. Total \$75. Carried.

Weir—Hunt That the following amounts as Ward expenditures be paid namely:— Ward 1—\$178.28, Ward 2—\$200.50, Ward 3—\$184.40, Ward 4 \$199.15. Total \$762.43. Carried.

McMillan—Weir That Mrs Flora McLean be allowed to put a fence across the width of the street passing through her property in the village of Priceville, as the said street is not of any convenience to any of the ratepayers of the township and that said fence will be a protection to her property. Carried.

McMillan—Arrowsmith That collectors of taxes be appointed for the year 1905 as follows:—Ward 1—Thos. McArthur, Ward 2—Archie McMillan, Ward 3—Thos Cook, Ward 4—John Ellison Jr, and that the salary of each shall be \$25. Carried.

McMillan—Weir That George Arrowsmith and E W Hunt be paid \$8 for overhauling painting of hall. Carried.

By-law No 44 striking rates was introduced and read a first and second time.

Hunt—Weir That after having heard the report of the Committee appointed to examine the bridge at lot 47, con 3, N. D. H. they being of the opinion that a new bridge was necessary, we therefore concur in that opinion. We also move that the committee go on and have the work completed as soon as possible. Carried.

Weir—McMillan—That a cheque for \$285.09 be issued in favor of W. J. Hamilton, being balance due him for road levies and that Mr. Arrowsmith pay the same when deeds are signed. Carried.

Weir—Arrowsmith That M. J. O'Hanley be paid \$25 for two elevations comprising 3 1/2 acres of land being parts of lot 26, con 8, and 25, con 9 and that the Clerk be paid \$3 for preparing deeds and getting them executed in connection therewith.
