RIOTING AT TOKIO.

Mob Burned Home Minister's Home and Threatened Others.

A Tokio cable despatch says: Se. rious rioting followed the attack to-day on the office of the Kokumin Shimbun the Government organ. A mob attacked and burned the official residence of the Minister of Home Affairs, which stood between the Nobles' Club and the Imperial Hotel, and faced Hibaya Park, which was the storm centre throughout the day. Threatening demonstrations occurred in the neighborhood of the official homes of Premier Katsura and Baron Komura (the Foreign Minister now in the United States), but the police succeeded in preventing injury to the occupants or damage to the houses.
