

County Councils will be Reduced.

CHEAP. STORE From 1907 County Councils will consist of Reeves of townships and Mayors of towns, but they will be smaller in number than they were previous to 1807. #### Close the Hotels.

In connection with the movement hat is on foot to eliminate undesirable eatures, such as games of chance and the sale of liquor, in connection with the Agricultural Exhibitions of the province, MraH. B. Cowan, Provincial Superintendent of Agricultural Societies has received letters suggesting that an effort should be made to close the bars of all hotels with in five miles of the place where an exhibition is being held on the day of the exhibition. Advocates of this measure point cut that most of the undesirable features complained of are conducted in connection with the exhibitions which hold horse races, and that in the case of a large proportion, of these Societies, the greater part of the purses for the horse races are subscribed by the hetel keepers.

It is also contended that a certain class of people go to the exhibition with the intention of having a high old time, and getting drank, and that the scenes around hotels the day of the exhibition, particularly in the evening, are often of the most disgusting nature. It is contended that if the hotels were closed on the day of the exhibition, great blow would be struck for the purification of the agricultural Socie-ties. It is probable that the matter will be discussed at the next convention of the Ontario Association of Fairs and Exhibitions.

## BRITISH EMPIRE.

As one surveys the present aspect of impressive, atter the rise of Japan, than the favorable position of the British Empire. Within less than five years a striking change has taken place. British diplomacy has been less spectacular than solid of late. The world heard nothing from Down ing street during the conference : strongly than Britain. The alliance, in its new form, how-

ever besides guaranteeing the results of the Russian Japanese war, strengthens Britain's position in Asia to an unprecedented point. As now worded the treaty provides that either Britain or Japan will go the aid of the other if attacked by only one power in matters pertaining to Asia east of the 51st degree of longtitude. The 51st degree runs through the western part of Persia, and consequently the alliance embraces every part of Asia where Japanese assistance could be of value to the British Empire. Thus a Japanese army is secured for the defence of the southern part of Persia, and for the defence of India anywhere along its frontier. Lord Kitchener has lately said that 'the only great war on land, in which the British Empire is likely to be engaged is on the Indian frontier. A summary of the empire's present advantages in Asia, therefore, must be inclusive of these points: Russian advance in Asia checked; integrity of China and the open door guaranteed; supremacy in Thibet, Afghanistan and southern Persia; India sately guarded against possible attack from the only possible foe.
