Game Laws.

Some Changes made in the close Season.

The close season, according to the copy of the Act issued by the Ontario Game Commission for 1905 is as follows: Deer. Nov. 15th to Nov. 1-t.

For Moose, Reindeer or caribon, south of the main line C. P. R., is same season as deer, north of C. P. R. the season runs from Oct. 16 to Nov. 15, both days

No Elk or Wapiti can be hunted at any time in Ontario.

Grouse, pheasants, prairie fowl or partridge, woodcook, black or grey squirrels, open season, Sept. 15 to Dec. 15. Quail or wild turkeys Nov. 1st to Dec.

Swan or geese, Sept. 15 to May 1st. Duck of all kinds, Sept, 1st to Dec. 15. Snipe, rail, plover, Sept. 15 to Dec. 15. Hares from Oct. Ist to Dec. 31.

Beaver and otter are prohibited until

Muskrat can not be hunted from May Ist to Jan'y 1st and can not be shot in

The chief change in the law relates to the season for shooting hares, which has just been moved later and opens now on the first of October instead of Sept. 15th. The hare season also closes later. on the 31st of December.

Lightning and Barns,

"Why are so many barns struck by put to Mr L. Blake astronomical office at the Toronto Observatory.

The impression that there are may he due to greater publicity given to the occurrences. You may have noticed that more barns than bouses are burned by lightning. I think that is because the barns generally contain hay and grain. which are moist to a certain extent, and moisture attracts lightning because it i a good conductor. On the other hand, houses are dry. Lightning rods are a good protection if they are numerous enough and have good ground connec-

"Isit of any value to have trees near

"Well lightning usually strikes a tree ecause it contains sap, which is moisture. The denuding of the forests, I think, may increase the danger from lightning, as it makes the air drier.

Lightning is simply at accumulation of electricity in the air seeking the other pole, and in doing so it comes down brough the air to the earth through any convenient medium.
