

Rural Deanery of Grey.

The semi-annual meeting of the Ruridecanal chapter of Grey was held in Markdale on the afternoon of Tuesday, September 19th. The members met in Christ Church at 2.30, the Rey. J. Ardill. Rural Dean, in the chair. The Rey. E Aprlevard was secretary. Rev J. R. Newell read the ninety-first Psalm, and Rev. G. M. Franklin said the prayers. One of the most important matters on the agenda paper was the advisability of closing the mission station at Rayenna, Collingwood township. The parish of Heathcote which is in charge of the Rev. J. G. Hooper is at present composed of Heathcote, Banks, Duncan and Ravenna. Mr Hooper said that the people who had contributed to Men's Umbrellas, worth 1.50 for 90 the support of services at Ravenna belonged rightfully to two other parishes, and that it would be in his laterest and that of the Church to close the said mission station. The Chapter by motion made the desired recommendation to the Executive Committee of the diocese.
