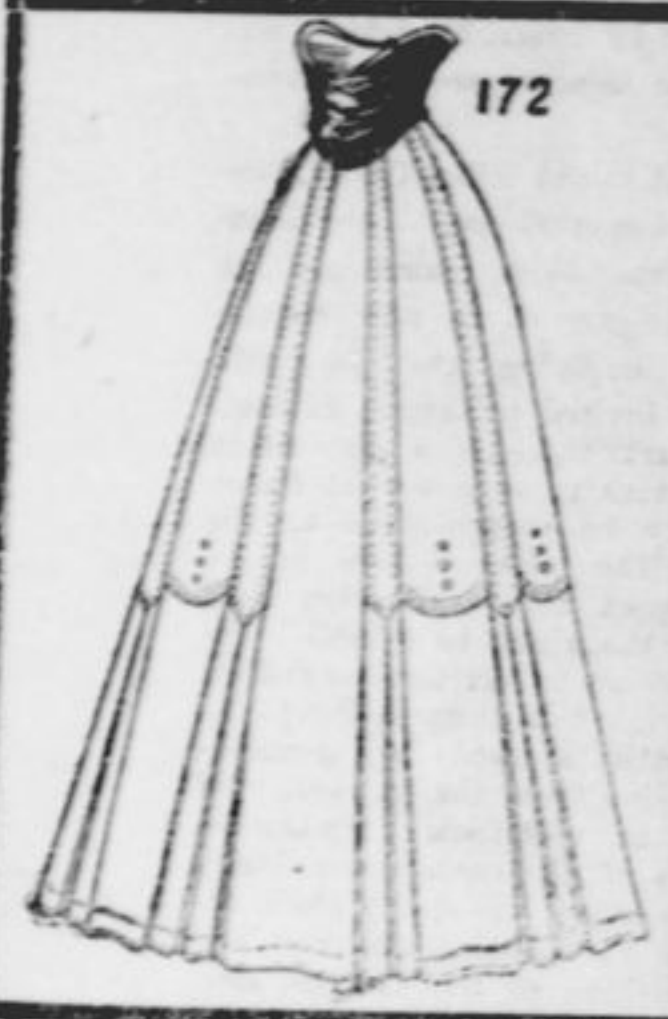

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Bentnick Show.

The coffers of the Agricultural Society of Bentnick will be in a healthy condition after the great success of their Annual Show. They have occasionally met with hard luck as to weather, but this year the most attractive brand of that necessary article was furnished and brought out the yeomen of Bentnick and Brant with their wives, sons and daughters in great numbers.

In the hall, which is too small for its purpose, was found a large and varied collection of roots and grain, also a bewildering display of ladies' work of the fancy as well as of the culinary kind. As might be looked for in such a furniture town there was a fine display of furniture which had many admirers. The most extensive display of harness we ever saw at a show adorned the walls, while musical instruments, hardware, etc. were exhibited by some of the pushing merchants. A very modest exhibit of flowers and Fine Arts was seen which was not at all representative of the intelligent, progressive community. Amongst Photographer Bailey's exhibits was a "sculptograph" portrait of the late Rev. Mr Jansen, a ne likeness, and intended for a member of Durham Presbyterian church. Outside, the enterprising Engels had an overhead tent erected under which was suspended an array of high priced fur goods, which looked strangely out of place on the broiling hot day.

A stroll round the live stock areas impressed one with the lack of accommodation for proper housing. Perhaps this is the reason for a somewhat limited display of sheep, swine and cattle. The quality was worthy if quantity wasn't. The Herds, in the sheep classes were large prize takers, and we noticed Mr John Cooper of Hampden, a prize winner in the horse classes.

The Directors this year cut everything in the nature of "speeding in the ring" and substituted substantial prizes for School children's drill either fancy or military. This was the chief feature of the afternoon, and was a good one, but it is doubtful if it would ever acquire or retain the popularity which attaches to a horse race. The public like strenuous competitors in the same field at the same time, and this exhibition of young Canada in training scarcely supplies, though it is a healthy and delightful exhibition.

Scene, Chesley and Hanover schools entered into the competition, and were awarded honors in the order named. Chesley boys in bright uniform and with dumb bells, came first, and were put through their facings in good style. Hanover had been but a brief time in training, but presented a good military drill. Scene, in charge of a lady, Miss McNeill, made by far the most spectacular showing, both boys and girls being performers, each bearing a flag and a hoop with which they embellished many intricate evolutions. The Judge was a Walkerton man.

Much disappointment was felt when it was learned that the match between Hanover and Durham was not to be played owing to the non-appearance of the latter team. A game was gotten up by the local men however which did something to fill the bill. We did not learn the gate receipts, but local men expected that a record had been made.
