The Council met September 16th pursuant to adjournment. All the members present, the Reeve in the chair, minutes of last meeting read and confirmed, communications read as follows: From Hon Nelson Monteth in Constipation of County Councils. From County Treasurer, list of arrears of taxes and advertised list from Dr Hutton re case of Diptheria. From Dan McInnes certificate for gravel.

Messrs Arrowsmith and Hunt were instructed to build snow fence on Morrow's Hill if they thought it necessary for the safety of travel.

McMillan—Weir—That Commissioner for Ward 4 be granted \$10 to repair sidewalk on Townline at Doroach providing De-luck Council grant an equivalent.

McMillan—Weir—That this municipality will hold all parties coming and running traction engines liable for damages caused to bridges unless they strictly comply with the law respecting the running of such engines. Carried.

Hunt—Weir—That Geo Arrowsmith and John Varty is hereby authorized to collect the amounts subscribed to assist in defraying the expenses of the road bought from Mr Hamilton. Carried.

McMillan—Arrowsmith—That Tios Greewood be paid \$2 for half day's work for two men and team at lot 27, cou 8 and E W Hunt be paid \$1.25 for over-setting work at the same place. Carried.

Arrowsmith—Hunt—That check issue for statute labor fund as follows: Ward 1 1904 \$7.50 and for 1905 \$4, total 11.50; Ward 2 for 1904 \$6 and for 1905 10.50; total 16.50. Ward 3 for 1904 \$6 and for 1905 \$1; total \$7. Ward 4 for 1904 \$2 and for 1905 \$2; total \$4. Carried.

Hunt—McMillan—That Geo Arrowsmith be paid \$2, the Reeve 5.00 and Mr Fairley \$6 for services in repairing Orr's Bridge. Carried.

Hunt—Weir—That Tios Greewood be paid \$20 for cedar timber for divert at lot 27, cou 8. Carried.

Weir—McMillan—That accounts for gravel be paid as follows: D McCornick 5.45, Tios Greewood \$2, John White, 2.90, Wm Leonard 1.25, W J Young 1.00, and Wm Wisner 3.85. Carried.

McMillan—Hunt—That Geo E Arrowsmith be paid 5.00 commission on moneys spent on roads. Also J A McMillan 3.00, E W Hunt 3.00 and Wm Weir 2.00. Carried.

### Telling Temperance Truths.

Contributed by the W. C. T. U.

The following statistics were compiled by the National W. C. T. U., to be used in printed form, as a part of its exhibit at the World's Fair at St. Louis. Large placards bearing these figures aroused so much interest that they have been duplicated in a series of four leaflets:

#### No. 1. PROHIBITION STATES, MAINE.

There is not a single brewery or distillery in the State. There is not as much liquor in fifty illegal places in Maine as in one well-equipped saloon in a license State.

Maine has \$103.76 per capita deposited in its savings banks. Illinois has only \$20.75 per capita deposited.

Ohio has only \$11.58 deposited per capita. In entire State of Maine there were, fifty years ago, five savings institutions and the whole savings institutions amounted to less than \$20,000 while today, after fifty years of prohibition, there are 57 savings banks in our State, 22 building and loan associations, 37 trust companies with aggregate deposits of more than \$19,000,000—the savings of the people under prohibition, and there is no other thing that it can be attributed to.—SHERIFF PEABSON.

KANSAS. 44 counties are without a pauper. 52 have no poor-house. 37 counties have not a single occupant in the jail. 37 counties have not a criminal case on the court docket.

NORTH DAKOTA. Leading citizens testify that prohibition has lessened crime, secured better local government, raised the tone of morals, reduced the tax rates, increased the bank deposits, raised the value of farms.

17,000,000 out of 27,000,000 people in the Southern States are living under absolute prohibition.

### New Marriage Regulations.

Hon. W. J. Hanna, has issued new regulations respecting the registration of marriages. There are between 18,000 and 19,000 marriages each year in the province of Ontario, and from 500 to 800 of these are not registered, while many are delayed in some cases 15 months.

Important changes for the purpose of ensuring the safe keeping of the records are announced by the Registrar-General's Department of the Ontario Government. The preservation of licenses is to be taken out of the hands of officiating ministers, and is to be handled in a more business-like way by the department itself.

After the performance of the ceremony, under the new regulations, the clergyman is directed to forward the documents in his possession to the registrar's office in the Queen's Park.

The following is a statement of the changes handed out by the department:

1. Under former regulations all licenses are held in possession of the officiating clergyman.

Under new regulations all licenses are to be endorsed on the back and forwarded to the Registrar-General, Toronto, by the clergyman. This does not do away with the registration of marriages.

All marriages must be registered by official cards, giving full details to the Division-Registrars of the municipalities where marriages are performed.

2. Formerly the issuers of licenses were required to send a license card to the Registrar-General upon the issue of every license, retaining the affidavit in his possession. By the new order the license is required to fill out the details in a prepared form printed on the back of the affidavit, and forward it to the Registrar-General instead of the license card.

3. Both the affidavits, and licenses are to be placed on file in the Registrar-General's Department, Toronto, for future reference and safe keeping.

4. Duplicate official envelopes are supplied to issuers of licenses, one to be used in sending the affidavit to the Registrar-General's Department, and one to be sent with each license issued, for the use of the officiating clergyman in making the license, to the Registrar-General.
