One of Slade's best tricks, and one which is little known, was exposed by Harry Kellar, the American magician, after it had mystified hundreds of investigators. Soon a scratching noise would be heard, and when it stopped the plates were separated, and on the surface of one of them would be found a lot of writing in chalk. This was a puzzle for a while, as the slate never was out of the grasp of one of the committee from the time all had seen its clean surface until the writing was exposed to view. It was dis-covered that before the slate had been shown to the audience as clean, the medium had done the writing in an invisible chemical, which could not even be detected by the committee. Britain's 33-Knot Destroyers.

Contracts have now been arranged for the construction of five sea-going destroyers included in the navy program One peculiarity of the Transvaal climate for the current year. These vessels are that, while being very healthy, it yet has a great advance upon anything that has yet been done in torpedo boat destroyers, as the speed guaranteed, under pencarrying a load of coal sufficient to give them a radius of action of 3,000 miles at about ten knots speed.

This condition is much more severe than was exacted in the case of the 30knot torpedo boats; and, moreover, the scantlings proposed for these high speed craft will be considerably heavier. It is true that speeds of thirty-two to thirtythree knots were attempted by one or two builders in connection with the 1897-98 programme, but the highest realized on trial was thirty-one and one-half knots. Even then the boats were not required to meet the same stringent conditions as is the case with these new thirty-knot hrd lhm rd hm h mhm am thirty-three knot craft. The boilers are to be of the express type, adaptable for using oil fuel, and the propelling mach-inery in all cases will be of the Parsons turbine type. The displacement of the boats will average over 800 tons, so that very considerable power will require to be developed to attain the speed. It is the intention to order later an experimental destroyer, which it is expected will have a speed of thirty-six knots.-London Daily Graphic.
