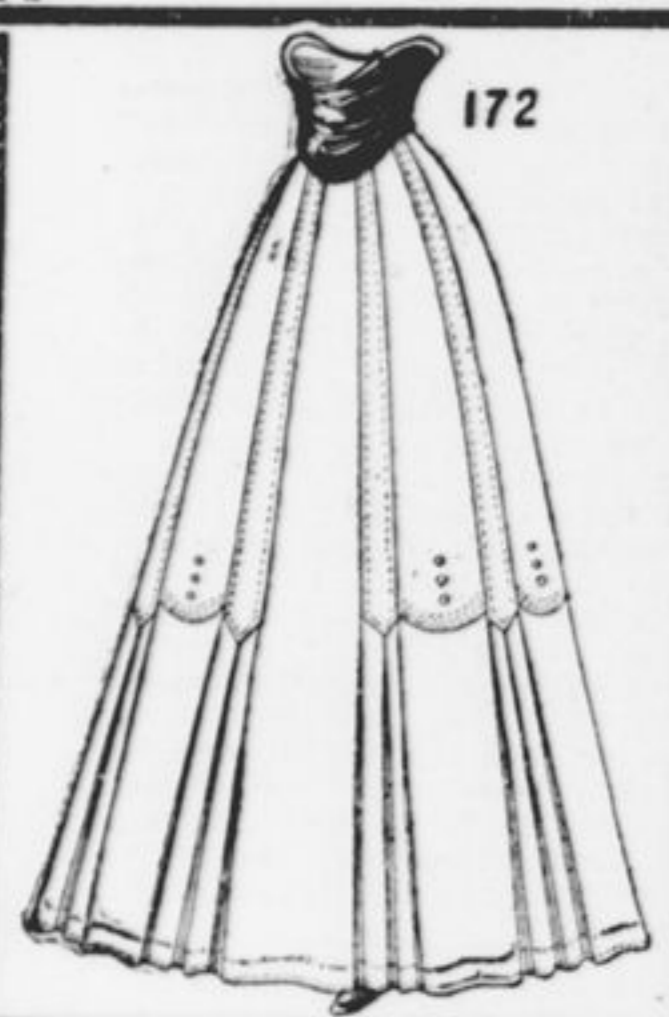

Horatio Nelson.

On the 21st day of this month, one hundred years have rolled by since that famous victory in Trafalgar Bay, which placed Britain firmly in possession of the seas, and cast her the life of her darling ideal and Admiral, Lord Nelson. The lapse of time has not dimmed in the memories of his grateful countrymen admiration of the victor nor lessened the effects of his victory and it is becoming as this 100th milestone approaches, that notice should be taken of the great epoch before it passes by.

The wooden walls in those days would be toys in modern warfare, but though wood has given place to steel, the use of wind to steam, and three-masted to battle ships that are floating forts, to improve an expected navy is found on the courageous and patriotic human heart that on 21st October, 1805, wert down to death victorious. We make a selection from a thoughtful article:

On Oct. 21st, the British Empire will celebrate the hundredth anniversary of Nelson's death. It was a sad, and yet a great day for England, the 21st day of October, 1805; and because the sun went down on the cold still form of the nation's hero! great because it saw the majestic dawning of the greatest power the world has so far known—the naval supremacy of England. After the lapse of a century, during which developments have taken place of which the wildest visionary of Nelson's day never dreamed it is possible to look back upon upon that day with feelings in which sorrow has no part—feelings of unalloyed pride and admiration in which the whole Empire shares and in which even the bitterest enemies of that Empire will not deny that his sons are wholly justified.

F. Nelson, in 1805, was the nation's darling and the nation's pride and "Nelson" in 1905, is the name of a man who died as he lived, in the service of his country whose laurels remain untarnished after the lapse of a hundred turbulent years whose name lives forever in the hearts of the nation in whose glorious list of heroes he stands, by virtue of his achievements and the single grandeur of his career, a dominant figure of honor, devotion and patriotism.

We celebrate this year of grace, nineteen hundred and five, the centenary of the sailor-hero who wrung freedom from the nations of the world the command of the seas making the country he loved so dearly mistress of the waters. It was this vast achievement which rendered the Peninsula War possible; it was the victories of Wellington in Spain which broke the power of Napoleon; it was the destruction of that military genius at Waterloo which which terminated military despotism, and enabled Europe to enter upon the prosperity it enjoys to-day.

The ultimate effect of an action appizes its real value and viewed in this light, Nelson's battles, culminating in the glorious victory at Trafalgar must be regarded as the most important conquests won in modern times, for through them war was replaced by peace, chaos to order, and through the ensuing peace Britain became the mighty and pre-eminent nation she is to-day.

It is impossible to ascribe too much glory to the wonderful sea-king whose victories laid the foundation of our present political and commercial supremacy. The whole English-speaking race rises to-day to do him honor; every true Briton doffs his cap this centenary year in honor of the hero of the seas, who, despite insurmountable obstacles, affected his mission gloriously, spending his noble patriotism for the country he loved so much, and giving its sons for all ages that inspiring motto which none can ever rear or listen to unmoved—"England expects that every man will do his duty!"—Richard H. Holme, "The Life of Nelson."

Great Men Dead.

Sir Henry Irving, one of the greatest of the world's actors and stage managers died last week, and died almost in harness. He had been performing the evening he died and had just returned to his rooms when the summons came. The British press and public are greatly moved, and telegrams of condolence from crowned and uncrowned heads in many civilized countries were received by the family. He is to be buried in Westminster Abbey.

Senator Fulford, of Brockville, was thrown out of an automobile near Newton, Mass., a week ago. His chauffeur died in three days from injuries received, and it was thought the Senator would recover. However, he is dead at the age of 53 and leaves a fortune of \$5,000,000 behind him. As the proprietor of "Pink Pills for Pale People," he is known the world over. He bought the receipt for a mere song about 20 years ago, and his surpassing business ability did the rest. He was an enthusiastic Liberal in politics and was appointed a Senator a few years ago.
