Sir Wilfred Laurier on Forestry.

A great Forestry Convention is to be held in Ottawa from the 10th to the 12th of January next, under most distinguished auspices. The following letter from Sir Wilfred Laurier to the press will explain the matter. The weight of his great name as President will do much to awaken interest to the necessity of judicious preservation of our forests and of the reforestation of many otherwise useless areas.

Office of the Prime Minister of Canada.
Ottawa, 21st Aug., 1905.
To the Public of the Dominion of Canada.

Canada possesses one of the largest areas of virgin forest of any country in the world and is ranked by European experts first, or among the first, of the important sources of the world's timber supply for the future.

The preservation of the streams in perennial and constant flow, which is largely controlled by the forests on the watersheds, will have an important influence on the industrial and agricultural development of the Dominion. The expansion of our electrical and mechanical industries will be regulated to a great extent by water, which forms the greatest source of power in all countries, and some of our western districts are dependent on irrigation to ensure the success of agricultural operations.

In all the older provinces the clearing of the soil has been carried to such an extent that the ill effects on the water supply and on agriculture are clearly marked, while on the western prairies the need of sheltering trees for houses and fields is seriously felt by the settlers.

The early construction of the Transcontinental Railway, and of other railways through our northern forested districts and the consequent opening of those districts to general traffic, will increase the danger from fire which has already been a most active agent of destruction.

These conditions are not new; they have from time to time received public attention, and during the Session just closed Parliament authorized the summoning of a convention for the more thorough discussion of the same.

I therefore hereby call a public convention to meet in the City of Ottawa on the 10th, 11th and 12th of January 1906, under the auspices of the Canadian Forestry Association, and to this convention are specially invited: Members of the Senate and House of Commons, Lieutenant-Governors of the Provinces, Members of Legislative Councils and Legislative Assemblies of the Provinces, Dominion and Provincial Forest Officials, Members of the Canadian Forestry Association, Representatives of Lumbermen's Association, of Boards of Trade, of Universities, of Agricultural Colleges, of Farmer's Institutes, of Railway Companies, of the Canadian Society of Civil Engineers, Associations of Land Surveyors, Fish and Game Association, and all others who take an interest in Forestry.

An invitation is also extended to the Bureau of Forestry of the United States, the American Forestry Association and the State Forestry Bureaus and Associations to send representatives to this convention.

The New Postmaster-General.

The cares and onerous duties attaching to the above position compelled Sir Wm Mulock last week to resign the position on account of his health. Mr. A. B. Aylesworth has been sworn in as his successor.

Sir Wm Mulock, has occupied the position since 1896 and it is not too much to say has revolutionized the old order of things. He not only arrested the old recurring deficits of his predecessors and changed them to a surplus, but he reduced inland postage rates from 3 cts. to 2 cts. and foreign rates from 5 cts. to 2 cts. and in spite of all this gave a better service. His loss from the cabinet is the greatest. Laurier has yet retained but it is gratifying to see his place filled by such an able man as Aylesworth. Sir Wm. has been appointed to the Chief Judgeship of the Exchequer Court.
