Coyote Hunting.

Polsoning with strychnine is a favorite crat. means of killing coyotes in the southwest. The poison must be carefully prepared or the balt will not be touched by the wary animal. Often it is best to bury the bait. An Oklahoma farmer related this experience: After butchering some hogs he poisoned a hogskin and left it with other offal for a copote that nightly prowled about his promises. In the morning everything but the poisoned skin had been cleared away He left it two more nights, but it remained

Thinking that the animal would not eat the poisoned bait, he buried it. That night, the coyote dug up the hokskip and ate it, falling a victim to its deadly contents Since then the farmer has nover failed to poison coyotes when he buries the bait. to put the strychnine in chunks of meat that can be easily swallowed. A small animal-a bleeding dead rabbit is good-is dragged over the prairie and the morsels of balt left along the drag.

Two days before a general coyote hune in southwestern Oklahoma, a steer badly affected with humpy jaw was killed and left in the middle of the area to be hunted. During the first night the coyotes howled ! all night in the vicinity of the carcass, but failed to touch it.

The second day a hind quarter was separated from the carcass and dragged in a circult of a mile or two, the drag coming back to the carcass. During the following night the coyote picked the bones of the carcass bare. Thus gorged with beef they were in a condition favorable for their slaughter in the drive of the cext day, N. Y. Sun.

The cement pavements in many of the residence sections of the city very clearly show the effects of expansion and contraction due to changes in temperature. In well-laid pavements these movements are anticipated and provision made therefor, so that the destruction of the pavement is averted.

The amount of expansion of concrete has been very beautifully demonstrated in a practical way by an English engineer. He had constructed, a few years ago, a block of four-to-one granite concrete, 100 feet in length and one foot square, built on rollers, so as to be free to expand in any direction.
