

## NIAGARA FRUIT IN NEW YORK

Shipments of Niagara fruit to Toronto during the past season have been very heavy, but generally the fruit has been lacking in quality. The peach trees were so heavily laden that the fruit did not reach the usual perfection. The total amount received here by rail and water during September was 1,373 tons. of which 628 tons came by boat and 754 tons or 87,566 packages by rail. During the month 89 carloads or 1,135 tons of fruit were shipped by the wholesale houses to the trade throughout the province. In August receipts here totalled 1.021 tons, 358 by boat and 663 by rail. The total rail shipments for the year so far are 1,932 tons, an increase of 135 tons over last year.—Bradstreet's.

PRELATE ON RACE SUICIDE.

Bishop of London Says It is a Blight on the Middle Classes.


London, Oct. 23 .- The falling birthrate was the subject of interesting comment by the Bishop of London, Dr. Ingram, in an address to the clergy of his diocese in St. Paul's Cathedral today. He warned his hearers of the danger of this decreuse. It was impossible, the bishop said, to describe with what dismay he viewed this diminution of the birth-rate, not only in England, but in the colonies. It appeared to him to be an artificial diminution. The practice had spread like a blight among the middle clases, and must be viewed by the Church of England as a sin. The prevailing love of comfort was largely responsible for this, and the clergy must learn themselves and teach others to live the simple and heartier life which their forefathers lived.
