LETTERS to the EDITOR

Local Option.

To the Editor of the Review:— Mr Editor—

A great deal is being said at the present time on the temperance question and many are attempting to paint the matter of local option in such colors as to strip it of its real meaning. When we consider for one moment the insidious and captivating nature of our enemy, the enormous money interests by which it is upheld and the centuries during which it has been allowed to gain a foothold in our midst, it is really remarkable that our progress has been such as to drive it from many of its strongholds. We are cheered when we think of our success and we are determined to push the battle to the gates and victory will eventually crown Israel's ranks.

There is well concerted action on the part of the liquor traffic. One and perhaps the chief plan, is to "nip it in the bud" and to do so every possible pressure is brought to bear in the Municipal Councils in order to induce them to refuse to submit the by-law to the people. We are certainly proud of the action taken by the Municipal Council of the Township of Egremont. They were unanimous in submitting to the wishes of a very large proportion of the ratepayers of this municipality. The "blue ruin" cry rends the air because the craft is in danger.

They cry out, and lustily too, that the "place will be killed." Let us exemplify this in the case of local option in Toronto Junction. In March 1904 the by-law was carried by a majority of 25, but notice the results as given by a resident of that place. He says, "I have been here five months and I have seen but one drunken man on the streets. The treating system has been abolished. Business has never been better in the history of the town. The growth has been more rapid than in the "boom" days and is more solid. The population has increased nearly 2000 since the bars were closed. This may not all be attributed to local option. Other causes have helped but local option has not "killed the place" as many of the opponents of the measure predicted. Merchants say sales are greater and collections easier. About three hundred dwellings have been erected this year. These with other business places also erected represent an outlay of close to three quarters of a million of dollars. First class entertainment is provided for public at the hotels and one hotel has advertising "Seven meals for a dollar." The bar is not necessary to the prosperity of any place and if those now engaged in the traffic would content themselves with reasonable profits with the bar out of a most respectable and reasonably profitable business could be carried on.

The day of skirmishing is past and the time is now ripe for a decisive battle. In

the words of the Hon G. E. Foster we would say. Watch with eager eyes and bated breath as we storm the ranks and outworks. Scale the walls, spike the fatal guns and are lost amid the smoke and din of conflict. Thanking you Mr Editor for occupying so much of your valuable space. I am, yours, Temperance Worker.

Samples of Choice Grain for the Improvement of Seed. To the Editor of the Review DEAR SIR. By instruction of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture another distribution will be made this season of samples of the most productive sorts of grain to Canadian Farmers the improvement of seed. The stock for distribution is of the very best and has been secured mainly from the excellent crops recently had at the branch Experimental Farms at Indian Head Sask., and at Brandon, Man. The distribution this spring will consist of samples of oats, spring wheat, barley, Indian corn (for ensilage only) and potatoes. The quantity of oats to be sent this year will be 4 lbs, and of wheat or barley 5 lbs, sufficient in each case to sow one-twentieth an acre. The Samples of Indian corn and potatoes will weigh 8 lbs. as heretofore. A quantity of each of the following varieties has been secured for this distribution:—

OATS.—Banner, Wide-Awake. Abundance, Thousand Dollar, Improved Ligo-w, Goldfinder and Waverley.

WHEAT.—Preston, Re Fo. Percy Stanley, Huron Laurel and White Fife.

BARLEY.—Six-rowsed—Mensury, Odessa Mansfield, Claude and Royal. Two-rowsed.—Standwell, Invincible, Canadian Thorpe and Sidney.

INDIAN CORN (for ensilage).—Early sorts, Angel of Midnight, Compton's Early and Longfellow; later varieties, Selected Learning, Early Mastodon and White Cap Yellow Dent.

POTATOES.—Carman No 1, Early White Prize, Rochester Rose, Uncle Sam, American Wonder, Bovee, Early Andes and late Poritan.

Every farmer may apply, but only one sample can be sent to each applicant, hence if an individual receives a sample of oats he cannot also receive one of wheat, barley or potatoes. List of names from one individual, or applications for more than one sample for one household cannot be entertained. These samples will be sent free of charge through the mail.

Applications should be addressed to the Director of experimental Farms, Ottawa, and may be sent in any time before the 1st of March, after which the list will be closed, so that all the samples asked for may be sent out in good time for sowing. Parties wishing should mention the sort of variety they would prefer, with a second sort as an alternative, and should the available stock of both these varieties be exhausted, some other good sort will be sent instead. Those applying for Indian corn or potatoes will please bear in mind that the corn is not available for distribution until March or April, and that potatoes cannot be mailed from here until danger from frost is transit is over. No postage is required on mail matter addressed to the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa.

Look Out for Fire. The Underwriters' association have issued the following circular under the heading "Re Christmas Decorations and Displays" which explains itself:—

DEAR SIR:— I beg to call your attention to the dangers to life and property from Christmas decorations, displays, etc., which are frequently made at this time. The use of Christmas greens, harvest specimens and other inflammable materials such as draperies, scenery, cotton to represent snow, and the like (especially in connection with electric and other lighting system), is decidedly an increase of hazard, it being impossible to make displays of that nature perfectly safe.

The third Statutory Condition of your insurance policy reads in part as follows:— "Any change material to the risk, but within the control or knowledge of the assured, shall avoid the policy, as to the part affected thereby, unless the change is promptly notified in writing to the Company or its local agent."

In addition to the danger to property from the displays referred to, the danger to life in crowded stores or places of meeting, by reason of a panic occasioned by a fire, even though it be small and easily controlled, is so great that the Underwriters, who have made a study of such hazards, would fail in their duty should they not give this warning.
