The Guillotine.

Mr. H. H. Miller M. P., recently received from a Dominion member representing another Riding, a letter in which the following is an excerpt: "Are you having much trouble from your supporters asking for reprisals to the Whitney Government's dismissals from office? Practically all of the Provincial civil servants of my Riding, right down to the Issuers of Marriage Licenses, have been removed from office. I presume all of the Ontario Liberal members are up against the same proposition, and it does seem to me that the whole question should be carefully considered by the Federal Government. If we decapitated a few Conservative Federal office-holders it might prove a salutary check on the spoils crowd in Toronto."

Mr Miller's reply was as follows: "We are not, as yet, having any trouble in this Riding as to the dismissal of Provincial Government officials. None have been dismissed. Some of my political friends have suggested that if there be any dismissals I should in return, recommend the dismissal of Conservatives under the Dominion Government. I will not, however, under any circumstances, do anything of the kind. I am heartily and thoroughly opposed to the "spoils" system. If the Whitney Government make general what appears to have been their policy in many Ridings since they obtained office, and continue to dismiss officials under them who are and have been Reformers, and should the Dominion Government in any measure retaliate, we will at once, and probably for all time, have the American system and all Government officials will expect dismissal at every change of Government. The result will be that inexperienced and untried officials will be continually being appointed in the place of experienced men whose only faults have been their political opinions. With such a system in vogue officials will feel sure of their positions while they are in power and just as sure as sure that they must go when their party goes, and thus a great incentive to good and faithful service will have been removed."

I believe that the Whitney supporters by their so free use of the guillotine will weaken themselves. If we imitate them we will do ourselves and the country a great injury. So far as my Riding is concerned, I, while I represent it, will recommend that officials who do not offensively meddle in political affairs and who properly perform the duties of their offices shall be retained and that officials who persistently neglect their duties shall be dismissed."

We believe that the best men of South Grey, to whatever political party they may belong, will approve of Mr. Miller's reply and of his position upon the now much talked of subject to which the letters refer. No sensible loyal Canadian desires to have the pernicious American spoils system introduced into Canada, and the Reform Party, whose record along that line is so good had better resist every temptation and every demand to do anything that will encourage it.

Egremont Council

Council met Dec 15, minutes approved. An order was passed in favor of a toy for \$15 for A Prior's funeral expenses. A petition was presented by John Kennedy and 10 others asking for a USS to be formed on Eg't and Arthur townline but was not entertained.

The account of \$2 from Arch. McEachern could not be entertained until it is certified to by the pathmaster. Com'r Gordon reported on a water grievance on East Arthur Townline. He with the Reeve of Arthur deepened the ditch and put in a tin culvert; total cost \$31.50, Eg't's share \$15.75 less \$3.50 for tile. Com'r's fees \$2.

Also R Cantlin, cedar culvert and ditching 10th sideroad. Con 4-5, Cost \$8; Jno Carrie repairing two culverts, con 5-6, Cost \$4; Com'r's fees \$4. Com'r McArthur's expenditure—R Harper, sundry jobs, drawing tile, putting in culverts and ditching costing \$29.12 on Con 12 and 13, Neil Calder, drawing tile and culvert, \$3.50, A Stewart 2.25, A McGillivray ditching 2.85, Tho Watson culvert 2.00, Fees 4.00

Reeve's Expenditure—Chas McInnis, gravelling 79 rods cost \$63.20; filling the holes and repairing road 5.00; pavement recommended less 25.00; paid on account—Thos Weir, tile culvert and ditching, con 5-6; Com'r's fees 3.00, S Robb's acct of 50' for outlet to culverts was not entertained.

McNeil was paid \$7 use of council room. By-law No 191 to appoint D R O, Polling places, and place to hold nomination meeting on Friday 22nd inst, was passed and signed.

An order for \$2.25 in favor of Jno Waddell to buy wood for Mrs Barclay. Reeve read Financial Statement to Council and 200 were ordered to be paid. Reeve and clerk were paid \$3 each for preparing said statement.

Reeve read Dr Sneath's yearly report as M H officer which showed eight cases of Scarlet Fever reported in January, all in N E corner of Tp. These were strictly quarantined. Boothville school was disinfectant. In June there were four cases in one family—no deaths resulted—no diphtheria cases were reported. During last three months a large number of severe cases of Typhoid Fever had existed—infection could not be traced in all cases—No small pox in Tp, but there is an epidemic in a neighboring Tp and Board of Health should advise a general vaccination—No cases of Tuberculosis reported, measles have been epidemic in township almost the whole year, and some deaths from accompanying pneumonia were reported.

reported. Sundry accounts were paid out to \$215.70.

Motion for Reeve to vacate the chair and Mr Wm Lawrence take the same, Carried, McArthur—Robb—That a vote of thanks be now tendered to the Reeve for his able, able, and courteous manner displayed in discharging his duties as head of this council during the year now drawing to a close.

The chairman in presenting this vote of thanks to the Reeve spoke in the highest terms of commendation of the Reeve and Council. The vote replied after which the last council meeting of 1905 closed.
