

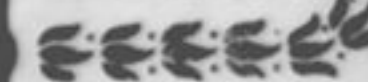

To the sorrowing family we extend the sympathy of this community. The remains were taken from Buffalo on New Year's day and interred in the R C cemetery at Orchard, Rev Father Owens, of Mt Forest, officiating at the grave. All the members of the family were present at the grave side with the exception of the two eldest, John and Alex.
