operate, and should support the great work of the Horticultural Society. He enumerated several shrubs suitable for lawns, such as hydrangea paniculata, dog woods, syringas, rosea, and the greatly improved lilacs now available. Study the seed catalogues was a parting advice. He would like perennials better understood, they should be divided up every three years or the roots get too numerous.

Mrs McTavish, of Bruce, who had addressed the Women's Institute in the afternoon, made the speech of the evening in the big hall. Her topic was "The Home" in its varying aspects. She is a fine direct speaker, her thoughts well arranged and well uttered and her address was very instructive and interesting.

She thought there was more unhappiness in the homes of the rich than of the poor and repeated Agur's admirable prayer "Give me neither poverty nor riches." The truest happiness in life was found in the love and esteem of children and the respect of friends while the little daily worries cause more trouble than the big things of life. Exercise the same courtesy in the home as is done to strangers, enjoy respect for the aged, they have made sacrifices for you. A few kind words in the midst of life's untiring but tiresome duties, goes a long way; be as ready to praise as to blame. Do this to your friends while you have them. Kind words are better than flowers on a coffin and a fulsome obituary.

Economy in the home was defined as "Making the best of everything and putting everything to its best use." Don't be ashamed to practise small economies, though it is sometimes poor economy to purchase an article because it is cheap. Be especially watchful in the economy of time. Cooking rich dainties, care of bric-a-brac, and the time spent by some young mothers in dressing their children immaculately was time unprofitably spent.

Keep a strict account of all expenditure, no one knows how money slips through fingers unless by accounts. Don't measure your needs with your neighbors, don't be ashamed to wear last year's article.

The home should have good literature, mothers should keep posted so as to talk with the boys and girls, farmers should have a good agricultural paper. Too many books have not one elevating thought. Cultivate in the home the practice of reading aloud, followed by discussions, each one should not sit in a corner with his own book or paper, have a good map for reference.

Getting proper rest is true economy, especially for mothers, who should not be ashamed to take an afternoon nap. Recreation such as is found in Institutes, summer excursions, vacations, etc was advised.

Mr Sherrington opened with a rebuke to the noisy elements in the meeting, before entering on a long address on the benefits direct and indirect of a flower and fruit garden. He gave practical hints for the cultivation of strawberries in the matted-row systems and other ways. Insisted on having them in long strips to facilitate cultivation, not fenced in a small enclosure as in older times. Some points were: never have fibrous roots exposed to sun and wind, never reset plants that have borne fruit, cultivate in the same direct on every time, large fruit was not profitable for canning and don't can berries that have had rain.

Raspberries, blackberries, currants, gooseberries were dealt with at length the latter being the best paying berry just now.

His address was full of good things, but altogether too long.
