Hopeville

In last week's paper we stated that we would give a report of the burial of the Rev Mr Morrison, but as it appeared in the Review last week we will only refer to a few omissions of Mr Morrison's connection with church matters in the early days in Proteston. The ordination and induction took place in a building west of the present Episcopalian Church, there not being any church built in this section then. About this time meetings were held in the school houses and private buildings and the question of choosing a church site was proposed and agreeing on it was the difficulty. One on lot 22, Con. 10, was talked of as being central, then the Esplan one as some few people had been buried there. Then Joseph McArdle offered a tree site on lot 12, con 12, of one acre where now stands the store of D. K. McArthur—next Rob. Scott offered a free site of one acre on lot 20, con 13, but finally the Esplan lot was purchased for \$25 at a meeting of the congregation held in Alex. Russell's barn and a committee was chosen to get subscriptions and build which consisted of Alexander McPhail, Geo. Sturrock, and Joseph McArdle. A bee was made to take out the timber and Mr Morrison was there as busy as any one. Considerable difficulty was experienced in getting all the material in for the building but after the summer's toil of the committee a nice frame church was built. At this time services were held in the McLean School House on lot 9, con 10, and one of the first if not the first child baptised there was Isiah Willis McArdle, now a barrister in Markdale. Then the next year Cedarville people began to build.

10,000 IMMIGRANTS.

The efforts of the Salvation Army on the lines of immigration were so successful last year that arrangements have been made for ten thousand people to leave the shores of Great Britain through the same agency during the coming season. These immigrants will be selected from a possible one hundred thousand applicants, and when it is known that each case is thoroughly investigated, and preference given only to those who are likely to make good settlers, the efforts of General Booth's worthy movement will be thoroughly appreciated by every Canadian.

Chartered Steamships.

The entire accommodation of three steamers has been chartered for this season's business, and the first organized party of 1,500 will embark on the S. S. Kensington, March 1st, arriving in Halifax ten days later. Many of these people are from the agricultural districts of Great Britain; in fact, the majority are coming to Canada intent on engaging in farm work, and will be distributed to farms in Ontario on arrival. Farmers who have not secured their help for the coming season will do well to write immediately to Brigadier Thos Howell, Secretary, S. A. Immigration Department, James and Albert Sts., Toronto.
