FIRST IN ONTARIO.—This is the claim made for the Model School at Athens, Ont., whose Principal, Cameron Ross McIntosh, an old Dornoch boy, is well known here. We were pleased to notice in the Brockville Records of the 16th inst a fine illustrated write up of the new school building, with cuts of the teachers, trustees, &c. From the Record we learn that Inspector Tilley grades this Model School first in province, a high compliment to Mr McIntosh. To the tabular report Mr Tilley appends the following: All the work done in this school is of a very high order. In securing the development of individual effort among his students which is one of the highest functions of a teacher, Mr McIntosh has achieved results which I have never seen equalled in any other school." Mr McIntosh is a graduate of Durham Model School which has sent out not a few brilliant teachers. He has developed along original lines as is evident by his methods given at great length in the Recorder. He runs his Model entirely by public speaking; aims to train every student in oratory; has weekly lectures on Education by prominent men, the only teacher in Ontario who does this; condemns system of rote taking, examinations being few and incidental and at no stated periods; uses "imaginary teaching," an original invention of his own, and the "result has been wonderful." Mr McIntosh is just finishing his course in Philosophy and Political Science preparatory to entering upon journalism. He has many relatives round here including the Campbells, Camerons, Greenwoods, &c. and these with many friends will rejoice to hear of the success attending the Dornoch boy. Annual Meeting, Feb. 7.

Intense interest is being taken on the eve of the great gathering of the shareholders in all that concerns the big mill and the various interests concerned. A meeting of the Directors was held at Stratford last week at which the report of the independent expert was presented, and it is said is a highly satisfactory document to all interested in the success of the mill.

We would like to have had this report to publish in full, or a synopsis of it, and why it should be held back is hard to say. The Directors are now in possession of the town committee's report and of the experts, but no report from the officials at the works has yet been made, though one is pending. There is a lack of candor in keeping the shareholders in the dark that is most exasperating and we hope it will meet its punishment at the forth coming meeting.

We are credibly informed Secy Ehrhardt is holding meetings at various points advocating still the removal of the mill. It is true and his salary still going on it is a glaring insult to the shareholders and who ever authorized it or condones it is unworthy of public trust. If not the servant of the company of course he is quite within his rights in holding all the meetings he wants to.

Manager Farr is not back yet. He has been frequently expected, word came that he was ill, now it is said he has made an engagement with an American concern, starts in February and won't be back at all. This is playing ducks and drakes with a million dollar plant. It was closed down without authority of the Directors. A month has elapsed and no repairs of any magnitude have been executed more or less aimlessly some men have been wasting their time the money of the shareholders is vanishing or debt is again being piled up, orders are coming in, shipments of cement are being made and before spring our bins may be empty, a month at least of good making weather has been lost, and the urgent and paying demands of early spring orders, may have to be sent elsewhere to more provident institutions.

Surely it is time for a change and we urge all shareholders to whom these lines shall come, to consider if this institution has got justice. During 1905 with many drawbacks the mill earned 14 pc. How much this splendid outfit could earn with thoroughly sympathetic officials and Board would surprise all.

Public Library and Reading Room

The adjourned annual meeting on Thursday last was well attended, and more interest taken in the work of the institution than for many years past. The financial account—were not yet closed but it is certain the standing is good, thanks to the contributions, the Dramatic Club Concert and the donations by the Town Council. A resolution of thanks to the Town Council was unanimously passed.

The Librarian's report showed an increase of several hundreds in the number of volumes issued during the year, the proportion of fiction of course, being still very large, more than half of the whole. There are evidences of increase in the class "General Literature," and perhaps in Science, but in History, Biography, Poetry and Religious Literature the interest seems to wane, a regrettable circumstance, calling for the earnest thought of parents, guardians and educators. A committee has been formed to consider the formation of a class of Junior Literature for use of the school. The election of officers resulted as follows: President: Jno A. Graham, 1st Vice President: N. W. Campbell; 2nd Vice President: Thos Allan; Treasurer: Jno Kelly; Secretary: C. Ramage.
