INTERNATIONAL LESSON NO. V FEBRUARY 4, 1906

(The Temptation of Jesus.—Matt. iv. 1-11.)

Commentary.—I. Jesus in the Wilderness (vs. 1-2). 1. Then—Immediately after his baptism. "Such are the violent alternations of human experience..."

2. Forty days—Moses, Elijah and the Lord could fast forty days because they were in communion with God and living a heavenly life.—Clarke. Luke says he was tempted during the whole of forty days.

3. The tempter came—How Satan appeared to Christ we do not know, but if he came in bodily form it must have been as an angel of light.

4. It is written—See Deut. viii. 3. In each case Jesus answered and defeated Satan by a proper use of the word of God.

according to Josephus, "he would become dizzy, His eyes being unable to reach to so vast a depth."

6. If Thou be, etc.—Satan presses his point. In His first reply to the devil Jesus had shown His unbounded confidence in God.

8. Exceeding high mountain—Some high mountain in Judea where a general view could be had of the country.

11. Devil leaveth him—Satan had made the strongest effort of which he was capable and had been baffled at every point.

17. There occurred in perfection all that was to be in Adam. He who was the sinless "Prophet" (Deut. xviii. 15; John vi. 14; Acts iii. 22, 26) in his life; the sacrificial "High Priest" (Heb. iii. 1; ix. 25-28) in his death; and will be the sovereign "King of kings" (Rev. xvii. 14; xix. 16) at His appearing and Kingdom, was emptied as Adam had been, but stood. He won a three-fold victory over Satan. He might open for us a complete "way of escape" (1 Cor. x. 13) from the effects of the fall. He was "led" (v. 1) into temptation, and overcame the tempter that He might teach His disciples to pray.

SEVEN BODIES FOUND IN RUINS OF BUILDING.

His Wife, Mother-in-Law and Five Children All Murdered and Their Bodies Cremated. All So Badly Burned That They Could Only be Told by the Difference in Size.

Pembroke, N. H., Jan. 22.—The authorities of Merrimack County, and of the town of Pembroke early to-day, resumed the investigation of the grim tragedy in which seven persons were victims and an eighth took his own life yesterday.

Ayer acted strangely after his arrival at the Bailey house, and the county officials concluded early in the evening, after a hasty investigation that he had murdered all seven members of his family as they lay in their beds, late Tuesday night or early yesterday morning.

The search of the ruins resulted in the finding of all five of the remaining bodies during the early hours of the forenoon. All were so badly burned that it was practically impossible to tell one from another save that a difference in size indicated that of the mother.
