Saugeen Presbytery.

At a special meeting of the Saugeen Presbytery held on Friday the 19th inst. A call from Cedarville and Esplan in favor of Rev J. P. McInnis was sustained, the induction, to take place at Cedarville on Tuesday, the 6th of February at 2 p. m., the moderator, Mr Hanna to preside, Mr Thompson to minister and Mr Little the people. On the recommendation of the committee which visited Moorefield and Drayton, these stations were separated, the separation to take effect on Feb. 1st. Rev. J. M. Aull was appointed interim moderator in both congregations and both are authorized to give a call to a minister.

Appreciative reference was made of the work and character of the late Mr Morrison and Rev Mr Young was appointed to send a letter of sympathy to Mrs Morrison.

On the same day was held a Sabbath School Worker's Association at which addresses were given by Mr. Jas. McMurchie, B. A. of Harrison, Mr. A. W. Wright, B. A. of Forest, and Rev J. S. Robertson B. D., general secretary for Sabbath Schools in the Presbyterian church in Canada. Mr. McMurchie spoke on "The Teacher's Memory and Imagination" and gave many useful suggestions as to the adaptation of the teaching to the child's mental growth. He contended that since the power to memorize was stronger in earlier than later years. Much more should be done in leading the children to commit to memory scripture passages and the Shorter Catechism than it is usually attempted. Mr Wright emphasized the need of self improvement as the first essential of a teacher's success. Comparatively few people could have the benefit of any general professional training but all could really increase the powers they have by steady and persistent practice. The teacher who loves the Saviour and conscientiously does his best with the gifts he possesses will succeed. Mr Robertson, who was cordially greeted on this, his first visit to the Saugeen Presbytery spoke on "Teacher Training Classes" and Supplemental Lessons." He showed how the efficiency of the Sabbath school would be greatly increased if teachers had a clearer view of the teaching of the Bible as a whole and had a somewhat more definite knowledge of the child mind and methods of imparting instruction. To help in this direction he showed the benefit "Teacher Training Classes" and gave an indication of the kind of work they are expected to do. To assist in the work small booklets, sold at 10 cts each had been prepared by the best minds in our church the study of which could be overtasked even by busy people. So popular had these proved that some of them were running their second and third edition by Prof. Murray, entitled "The First of twenty one" leading in the way with a circulation not only in Canada but in every state of the American Union. He complimented Drumore on the excellent work they had done in the classes there organized and indicated that they are the banner congregation in the Presbyterian church. Mr Robertson is thoroughly posted in his subject, is free and easy in his manner and has a winning personality. We bespeak him a still larger audience the next time he visits the Presbytery.

The discussion following the addresses was general and spirited, the layman for once coming to their own, delighting all with the vigor with which they can speak when a subject is up in which they are interested. The work of "Teacher Training" was heartily commended to the consideration of all the Sabbath Schools in the bounds and a meeting of real interest and profit brought to a close.

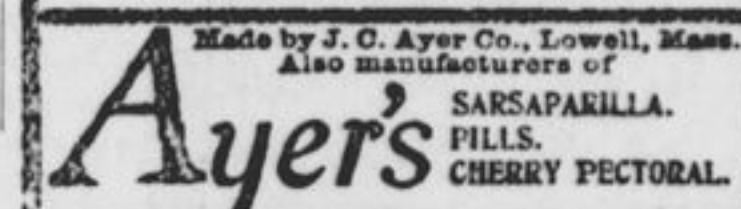
