### ADDITIONAL LOCALS.

A Provincial by-election took place in Kingston on Monday, the first since the incoming of Premier Whitney. Pense, the Liberal, was elected by 20 in 1905 but the seat was voided by irregularities. This time both parties signed agreements to run a pure election, and Pense is elected by 34 majority.

Mr Lochead, near Rob Roy, Glenelg, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs Penneck, Thursday, and was buried in the Durham cemetery Saturday. He was over 90 years of age. He came from near Orchardville to live with his daughter a few years ago, but we have no further particulars of his life.

King Christian, of Denmark, is dead at the age of 83. He is known and loved by British peoples as the father of our good Queen Alexandra, who will receive overwhelming sympathy from the whole nation. As the Globe remarks he was even fuller of honors than of years, and has kept the affection of all his children and his people unmarked degree.

Ostrich plumes in deep brown, shading to deep cream, are softly arranged against the flared brim.

### Presbyterian Annual Meeting.

The usual summing-up of the year's business of this body took place on Monday last, with a very large attendance at the business meeting of the afternoon.

The reports from the Ladies' Aid, the Guild, the W. F. M. S. and its Mission Band, the Missionary Society, the Sabbath School and other agencies, all showed a year of substantial work and progress. The cost of the manse was \$2350, of which over \$950 has been paid, and subscriptions for over \$1100 more are promised, so that the purchase will not be heavily felt by this strong congregation. Notwithstanding the extra effort and some special payments, the General Fund is in a healthy state, closing with a balance on hand of \$79.00. During the year from all the working bodies of the church, loose collections, etc., but not including balance on hand there has been raised the fine sum of \$3315.97. Mention is appropriately made in the Report of the legacy of \$1180.70, left by the late Mrs James Calvert to the Church Mission, but of course this sum is not included in the \$3315.97. From the Session Report we learn there were 15 marriages during the year, 10 baptisms, and a small increase in the membership which now stands at 310. A larger number of deaths than usual has occurred during the year, no fewer than 17 being recorded. The session report contains also some stimulating spiritual exhortations, and one is justified in concluding that spiritual and temporal prosperity have gone hand in hand.

Messrs T. McGirr and D. Edge wished to retire from the managing board after 24 and 22 years of service respectively. The congregation by a hearty vote of thanks expressed its appreciation of their long and faithful labors. To their counsel and advice in shady as well as in sunny years, has been in no small measure due the growth and stability of the Presbyterian Church in Durham, and though relieved of duty for a time, their example and precept will inspire others to similar faithfulness. Mr R. MacFarlane was re-elected, and new members of the Board are Messrs Wm. Weir, Don. McArthur, Campbell Milligan.

Votes of thanks were paid choir and other workers for services during the year, and adjournment was made to the basement where usually the ladies have provision made for a social time enjoyed this year to the full. An impromptu program was carried out, of music and brief speeches, a special welcome being given to Rev Mr Bice, who with Mrs Bice, shared in the hospitality of the evening. Mr Bice's remarks proved him to have a fund of ready humor, which he used effectively, and at the same time in serious strain gave much good advice. As a contribution to the question of providing a good place for young men to spend their evenings he suggested that the home was a good place, a very pregnant suggestion. He complimented the church on its successful year, but pointed out there was still room for aggressive work by all the churches, since not only Ontario, but even Durham was not saved. He urged them to strengthen their minister's hands by earnest prayer and practical service.

The benediction by Mr Bice closed the proceedings, and pastor and people went home with grateful hearts. We have spoken of efforts of individuals and societies: this notice would not be just were special mention not made of the untiring zeal and devotedness of Rev Mr Farquharson, whose ministry in Durham has been given many marks of favor, Divine and human.

### Estimable Citizen Gone.

Under the above heading a Manitique, Mich. paper records the death of Mr Norman McDonald, brother of A C McDonald of town, and John of Glenelg. Only about a month ago the family were bereaved by the death of their brother Neil and now the inexorable hand of death has opened the wound again. He died on 17th January at his home, and leaves a widow and one daughter 3 months old. We sympathize with the family in this double bereavement. The paper says: "He was born in Glenelg, Ont., about 44 years ago and came to Manitique in 1885. Prior to coming here he served as cook in lumber camps and boats. Later he engaged in the mercantile business at Cooks and for a number of years was quite a factor in social, church and business circles in that town. He was universally respected in this community and his death is genuinely mourned by many. He was always cheerful even when he knew that death was hovering in sight. He had lived a very exemplary life, and had an abiding faith and trust in the principles and tenets, that rob death of its terror.

The writer had the pleasure of knowing the deceased for many years, and hundreds of others, regrets his untimely demise. The bereaved widow and relatives have the sympathy of all."
