Newspaper Men on the Farm.

While in attendance at the Annual Meeting of the Canadian Press Association in Toronto last week, we had the pleasure of spending a day at the Agricultural College at Guelph. About 60 of the newspaper men with their ladies took in the excursion and arriving in Guelph were met by Pres-Creefman and took car to the grounds. We were first introduced to the Cattle building where a mechanical commingling apparatus was in operation and which contained a fine herd of dairy cows. The poultry building was next visited, where all listened with rapt attention to an address by Prof Graham who also satisfied all inquisitive minds on this branch. The Massey building with library, and various others were passed through, and by 1.30 a hungry throng passed into Macdonald Hall, where the girls in attendance treated the delegates to a dainty and attractive social dinner. Toasts—the King and the Press, were replied to by Messrs. J. P. Downey, M. P. P. South Well, Jos. T. Clark, editor of Saturday Night, Toronto, and E. J. Pense, newly elected M. P. P. for Kingston. Great tribute to the girls of the hall for the excellent repast provided, and commendation for the course of study taken up—sewing, cooking and laundry work was given by the speakers, who also voiced the sentiments of the gathering.

The afternoon was spent in the Judging building, the dairy, the chemical, and the grain buildings at the latter of which was explained the breeding of grain to produce better samples with larger yields. These are sent free in the spring to farmers writing for same. Lists will be sent out soon to all weekly papers with information to farmers who desire these samples. Under the charge of Supt. Creefman, a great work is being done at Ontario's 'Model Farm,' and as one of the speakers expressed it, it was perhaps so to the majority in attendance, 'The hall had never been told.'
