### County Council

At the Thursday evening meeting the following documents were read among others: Report of N. W. Campbell, public school inspector for South Grey; report of Dr. Ego, physician of the house of refuge, suggesting that a nurse should be employed permanently in the house of refuge; letter from Crown Attorney Armstrong, in reference to applying handouts to county constables, application from Mr. Harness manager of the house of refuge, for increase of salary.

Mr. Harness was present and handed in his report of the house of refuge up to the end of December last.

The following reports were presented: Finance, by Mr. J. W. Frost; County Property, by Mr. Paterson; Education, by Mr. Bell; Special Committee re Orchard Bridges, by Mr. Shute.

Report No. 2 of Finance, presented by Mr. Frost, recommended non payment of Wm Young's account of \$820 and Henry Hills account of \$12.19 for taking patients to the house of refuge as the committee did not deem council liable for a set of transference of patients to the house of refuge; that permission be given to the petitioners for the incorporation of the village of Shallow Lake of the scheme so desired; that application of the county clerk for increase of salary be granted, and the salary be increased from \$600 to \$700. Report was adopted.

Report of printing presented by Mr. McCannell, and Special Committee presented by Mr. McCollman, were carried without discussion.

By the report of Education Committee, presented by Mr. Bell, the reports of Inspectors H. H. Burgess of West Grey; S. Huff of East Grey; and N. W. Campbell, of South Grey were ordered to be printed in the minutes. The application of Owen Sound Collegiate Institute for \$1,078.50 as extra maintenance was granted; also of Collingwood Collegiate Institute for \$248.42; Meaford High School for \$878.27; Durham Public School's application for a special grant in aid of continuation work was laid over until next session and the clerk was instructed to obtain information as to work done and attendance and cost of maintenance. Mr. Bell, chairman of the committee, was appointed delegate to the next meeting of the Provincial Trustees Association at Toronto in April. This report was considered in committee with Mr. McArthur in the chair, before being adopted.

The other reports presented were adopted and council adjourned until Friday morning.

A letter was read by the clerk from the warden, notifying the council of a damaged bridge on the road to the village of St. Vincent, and the matter was referred to the road and bridge committee.

A report of Mr. Allen, chairman of the house of refuge committee of 1905 was adopted.

Council went into committee and spent some time in discussing a claim for damages to Mr. Hoffman's three-hum outfit through the collapse of a bridge over the Saugeen river near Orchardville. Mr. Pringle was in the chair and it was agreed to pay damages to the extent of \$250, as recommended by the special committee consisting of Messrs. Shute, Bell and McCannell. The original claim of damages was for \$510.

Mr. Jas. McLaughlin addressed the council in behalf of a generous grant to the general and marine hospital.

The county treasurer was instructed to pay the various school sections in the county entitled to receive the same amount equal to the government grant to said schools for continuation classes.

The road and bridge committee was instructed to take steps to prevent an accident at the ridge on town line between Artemesia and vernal half a mile north of Priceville by making the repairs necessary.

By report of Finance Committee at this session the sum of \$200 was ordered to be appropriated and paid to the credit of the Merchants Bank stationery account in compliance with the county treasurer's letter. The letter from the Canadian Association for prevention of tuberculosis asking that a delegate be sent to attend its meeting at Ottawa on 28th March was ordered to be filed, also the letter from National Sanitarium Association asking for a grant. The application of Meaford Poultry Association, asking for a grant was laid over for further consideration at June session. \$10 was granted to the Prisoners Aid Association of Canada. An account from Sullivan Township for refund of expenses connected with removal of a lunatic to Hamilton Asylum was not entertained on the ground that said lunatic was not in indigent circumstances. The application of W. J. Winter clerk of Chatsworth, to have a new bylaw granting certain debentures and interest thereon of the village of Chatsworth, passed at this session was granted.

Council adjourned until 8 p. m.

At the evening session on Friday, reports were presented from Finance, Printing, House of Refuge and Special Committee on Treasurer's surties.

Mr. J. W. Frost presented report of Finance committee, as follows: Your committee have had under consideration the application of Mr. Thos. Harness, superintendent of the house of refuge, asking for an increase of salary to \$800 per annum. The salary of Mr. Harness heretofore has been \$300 and that of his wife as matron \$200, with table supplies furnished. Your committee recommend an increase of \$50 per annum to each, commencing on 1st February next. Also that the county clerk's account for postage etc., amounting to \$11.16 be paid. This report was adopted.

By the report the House of Refuge Committee presented by Mr. Preston, the bill of Minnis Bros., of Markdale, for installing 57 lights and furnishing electric current to the house of refuge up till Dec. 31st, amounting to \$382.01 was passed. Dr. Ego's recommendation that a nurse be employed permanently in the house of refuge was not acted upon.

The report of House of Refuge was considered in committee with Mr. McCannell in the chair and discussed at some length but was adopted without amendment.

### The House of Refuge Statistics.

By the statement of Manager Harness of the house of refuge, presented to the county council, is shown the work which has been done during the past year. The total number of inmates admitted was 26, of whom 16 were males and 10 females, of this number 3 were males who were readmitted, 12 deaths occurred during the year, 7 males and 5 females. On January 1st, 1906, there were in the house of refuge 22 men and 11 women, a total of 33. Of this number 31 are chargeable on the county, there being one male and one female pay inmates. There is one married couple in the institution. The average age of inmates 71 years, the oldest inmate is 89 years and the youngest 40. The religious denominations are thus represented: Church of England 10, Presbyterian 8, Methodist 9, Baptist 4, Disciple 1, Roman Catholic 1. One man and woman are afflicted with locomotor ataxia, one man and one woman are blind, several of both sexes through age and infirmity are totally incapacitated from labor of any kind, and five are able to do light work. There is on the farm a span of working horses, 3 milch cows, 2 calves, 10 young pigs and about 40 hens.
