The personal oversight of such an energetic man of business, whose thoughts are all at home, who believes in the mill and the sources of its supply, cannot fail but afford a rosy prospect to the many shareholders who have invested good money in the Durham plant.

The very mild winter we are having will no doubt lead to an earlier resumption of operations than usual, repairing is well advanced, and better than all, orders are being received already for summer delivery.

Dr Jamieson, M. P. P. was in attendance at the annual meeting of the Georgia Cement Co last week. This plant declared a small dividend in November and another in January, though carrying a debt as large if not larger than the National. If this had been done here as Director McKechnie once proposed, it would have prevented a number from slaughtering their stock who could ill afford the loss.
