Work for the Legislature.

Among the measures that will be submitted during the present session of the Legislature will be respecting county councils; respecting the department of lands and mines; amending and consolidating the liquor license act; amending the volunteer land grants act; revising and amending the railway act; the street railway act and the electric railway act; amending the agricultural and arts act; amending and consolidating the several acts relating to companies; revising and amending acts relating to public schools, and the acts respecting the departments of education; respecting the university of Toronto; and amending the supplementary revenue act, 1899, providing for the taxation of railways and amendments to the mining laws.

Change of License Inspector.

The axe of the Whitney government has been busy throughout the country, but as far as South Grey is concerned there has been little to complain of. At last however, a notable change takes place, the Globe of Monday announcing that Mr Thos Davis, of Glenelg, succeeds Mr Thos A. Harris as License Inspector for South Grey. While we must admit there has been no unseemly haste in dismissing Mr Harris, as it was often predicted would be the case, yet it furnishes an instance of the evil effects of partyism, which too often sacrifices a good servant simply because his political color is not right. We are by no means saying nor insinuating that the new incumbent is not worthy, for we have no reason to think so, but it is certainly not for merit or neglect of duty that the old one is dismissed. About twelve only of the old set remain and it is absurd to suppose that the wholesale dismissals were for cause. It is of no use hiding the fact, the spoils system is in operation in Canada as well as in the States, and both parties have stooped to adopt it.

We congratulate Mr Davis on his appointment, showing his influence and standing in his party, and have no doubt he will, by faithful and efficient service, keep up the record of his predecessor in South Grey.

TOPICS OF THE WEEK

—Hon. G. W. Ross has declined a nomination to the Senate, a decision that will add to his popularity, for without doubt his presence on his old fighting ground will add interest to the debates, and be gratifying to his own side of the House. None too plenty in forensic talent.

—The Ontario House opened last week with the usual eclat and this week will be getting down to business on a good program in which educational matters promise to bulk largely. The country will welcome a fulfillment of Premier Whitney's promise of bringing important matters down early in the session, and thus get the air clear for the meeting of the big parliament in Ottawa on March 15.

—Sir Wilfred and Lady Laurier are in Toronto this week, and are being feted and honored to their heart's content. We presume more so. The premier as usual has made some telling speeches.

—The British Parliament was opened on Monday by King Edward in person, with the usual brilliant ceremonies. The speech from the throne is regarded as the most radical ever given.

A keen contest is in progress in North Toronto, a vacancy caused by the retirement of Dr Bestie Nesbitt on his appointment as Registrar of North Toronto. The conservative contestant is W. K. McNaught, Pres. of the Industrial Association, his opponent being ex mayor Uryghart. The latter is a most capable man municipally but a Toronto seat usually goes Conservative.

Some Bits of Local History.

Matrimonial felicity experienced many difficulties in the early days. Rev. Dr. Stewart of Kingston was the only regular clergyman from the Lower Province line to Kingston. Sighing swains were compelled to wait for months and in some cases for years before the golden opportunity presented itself. To obviate this difficulty, in many instances, magistrates, colonels, majors, adjutants and surgeons consented to perform the ceremony. By the Act of 1783 these irregular marriages were confirmed. Public opinion rapidly changed in favor of conferring the right to marry upon ministers of all denominations and in 1798 an Act was passed which made it lawful for the minister of any congregation professing to be a member of the church of Scotland, the Lutheran church, or a Calvinistic church, to marry according to the rights of such church. By a clause of this act the clergyman was compelled to appear at the Quarter Sessions, prove his office and take the oath of allegiance. It will be observed that, by this Act, the Methodists and some other denominations were treated with contempt by the authorities at that time ruling the province. In some instances the ministers were not disposed to quietly submit to the unjust law. Elder Ryan and the Rev Mr Smith, Ryan's son-in-law both performed the ceremony. Ryan was in consequence banished from the Province, but was pardoned. Smith stood his trial, acted as his own lawyer and got free. Justice was at last done by the Act of 1891, which in addition to the churches named, made it lawful for the remaining orthodox denominations to solemnize matrimony, after having obtained certificates from the Quarter Sessions. In May, 1814, the government appointed five persons in the province to issue marriage licenses, the point in Eastern Canada was Cornwall. Before this, notices of the intention of persons to marry were posted on trees by the roadside. In order to keep it secret, the parties most interested would often take them down. The costume of the bride did not consist of a fancy hat, kid gloves and a silk dress. But the most complete wardrobe consisted of a homespun dress, deer skin petticoats dyed blue by the bark of the soft maple and a squirrel skin bonnet. In many instances bride and bridegroom mounted the same horse and rode away, quite happily to the nearest magistrate. The honeymoon was sometimes taken in a vehicle made by sawing the wheels from the end of a very large log, putting an axle in and building a rough box above. And they lived happy ever after.—Exchange.
