Wilson, a daugh- Stewart of Kingston was the only regular clergyman from the Lower Province line to Kingston. Sighing swains were compelled to wait for months and in some cases for years before the golden opportunity presented itself. To obviate th s difficulty, in many instances, magistrates, colonels. majors, adjutants and surgeons consented to perform the ceremony. By the Act of 1783 these irregular marriages were confirmed. Public opinion rapidly changed in favor of conferring the right to marry upon ministers ef all denominations and in 1798 an Act was passed which made it lawful for the minister of any congregation professing to be a memed as we are made up. We make ber of the church of Scotland, the Lutheran church, or a Calyanistic church, to "Those who will not take the marry according to the rights of such Quarter Sessions, prove his office and take his cath of allegiance. It will be observed that, by this Act, the Methodists and some other denominations were treated with contempt by the authorities at that time ruling the province.
