### Consumption is Preventable.

The following points and suggestions regarding the prevention of Consumption which deserves the attention of everybody, are gathered from a recent article by Dr. Knoph, of New York which is to be found in the Medical Record of November 1905.

There are more cases of advanced tuberculosis to be treated than any other disease.

There is no disease where so much can be done to render the patient comfortable and hopeful as pulmonary tuberculosis in the advanced stage.

There is no disease where one case in a family can more readily become the cause of infection of other members, particularly in the stage where the consumptive begins to be confined to the association of the family members only.

It is extremely important to remember that advanced consumptive patients who are able to go about perhaps able to work at their calling in the office or factory, when ignorant or careless constitute the greatest danger to health of community. They must be considered as the most frequent cause of infection. The careless, ignorant or helpless consumptive when confined to bed can do little more than infect his room, but the advanced patient able to follow some calling can do it in his careless, scatter 7,000,000,000 bacilli every day with the greatest ease.

Of all tuberculous patients, he should be most carefully instructed and should be most deeply impressed with the fact that carelessness in the disposal of the sputum is dangerous to himself as well as to his neighbors.

As yet people generally have not been educated up to the point at which they are willing to carry and use a pocket flask or cardboard purse. Being desirous to conceal their condition, they are extremely reluctant to do anything which would call attention to their infirmity. Some way less likely to cause remark must be found. Probably the best that can be done in the meantime is to suggest that tuberculous men should have two pockets lined with some material which can be easily cleaned and that they should carry in one of these pockets very cheap handkerchiefs or bits of cheesecloth or other cheap material cut like handkerchiefs, which when used can be put into the other pocket and there kept until the close of the day when they can be easily destroyed or sterilized by boiling after their return home. In this way they can be escaped observation and at the same time secure their fellow-workmen and associates against danger. When so simple a precaution as this, and one so easily within the reach of every right thinking man is available, not to make use of it would seem to be little less than criminal neglect.

Com McArthur reported on Mutch's bridge being partially destroyed by the freshet; G Aies-4 rock stringers, 38 ft. \$12; P Mutch, drawing timber and gravel and work \$4.50; George Eckhardt 2 day's work \$3; G Robb, do \$3; W. F. Jordan do \$3; W Reid do \$3; W Sheldo do \$3; H Reid, work \$1; W Seaman, 30 pounds spikes, \$1. Reports accepted, com'r paid \$7 for fare and overeating. Com. Ferguson certified that he had examined Registry Office re Treasurer's Sureties and found them satisfactory. Cost of search \$1.75 and \$2 was paid for his services.

The Municipal Council endorse the request of petition re improved mail services on G. T. R. Durham branch.

By-Law No 195 to appoint an Assessor was passed. D. McIntyre received the appointment, salary \$80.00.

By-Law No 196, to appoint collectors, passed. W. Lawrence was appointed for N. D., salary \$35.00, D. Hunter for S. D., salary, \$35.00.

Geo. Waddell was paid \$8 87 for wood supplied to Mrs Barclay.

Geo. A. Swanston and others presented a petition asking for a drain under the Municipal D mage Act was granted and the necessary notice to be sent to Mr Davis, Aiton, who was appointed to do the work.

Owing to the change in the County Council, By-Law regarding the maintenance of the inmates of the County House of Refuge, that no more grants shall be made to the poor in this municipality after the first of May, 1906.

The treasurer was paid \$3 as expenses to Aytou re arrears of School Debentures. By-Law No 197, to appoint Pathmasters, was passed, list will be published. Auditors presented their report, was examined by reeve and council, and adopted as read, \$10.00 each was paid for their services.

Respecting an account from County Clerk for goods supplied W. Romains at House of Refuge, resolved that the clerk refer this account back to County Clerk for further information.

Resolved that the following accounts pass—G Hargrave gravel, 73 cts, W B Sutton, express charges, 55 cts, Municipal World Assessors' Supplies and forms, \$18.49; Clerk registration, —24 marriages, 74 births and 39 deaths, Fees \$27.40.

Council adjourned until May 29th, as a Court of Revision and general business. D. ALLAN, Clerk.

### The Dundalk Guide.

No, reader, this is not the title of a new paper, nor of a traveller's guide book to the mazes of the big city of Dundalk but an almost forgotten name of the first paper published in Dundalk a file of which has lately come into our possession. The publisher was Mr Joseph Townsend, who subsequently merged from Dundalk to Durham, and merged the year-old "Guide" into the "Grey Review."

The first issue is dated Feb 2, 1877, and the publisher very wisely, asks in his "Greeting," to be judged from what the paper contains rather than from its promises. It was a 4-page paper, 7 columns to a page, 22 inches long, and about half of it reading matter, well selected. We may from time to time give a whiff from the life of 29 years ago as reflected in this journal, this week giving merely a historical extract from the Publisher's "Greeting," which narrates the beginning of the now prosperous village.

We feel certain that this section of country will give a good support to this paper, and that with the rapid advance of Dundalk, the Guide will also participate in the prosperity of the place. It is only five years since the first building was put up at Dundalk station for the Railway company. In 1872 Mr James Reid erected a building for himself—the first in the village, Mr J. J. Middleton was the next to build, Mr Stenson next, and Mr Henry Graham followed in 1873. It is therefore about four years since the first buildings were erected at the Railway Station and now there is a prosperous village with over 400 inhabitants.
