
Mrs J. McGillivray, both of Westhope, N. Dak., visited friends in this burg last week. Mr Albert Middleton had a wood-bee

The Late Rev. A. McDiarmid.

The following account of the late Rev. Mr McDiarmid has been kindly sent as by Mr Robt. Mills, of Tilbury, formerly of Dornoch .- Ed.]

The Rev A. McDiarmid, retired Presbyterian clergyman, who for the past eleven years, has lived in Windsor passed away suddenly at his residence, Windsor, on Friday, Feb. 3.

The deceased was horn in Scotland and was in his 78th year. He was ordained to the ministry in Canada nearly half a century ago. He was stationed at Wallacetown for seven years. Amherstburg for four years, McKillop for the same period. Dornoch for nineteen years and Napier for three years.

For many years the stately ministerial, almost military figure of the grand old man has been familiar to Windsor people and his kindly and courteous presence will be much missed. As a minister during his active service, his pulpit manner and matter were typical of the impressive dignity of the old school, free from sensation and the semisecular Vanities that mar modern day sermonizing. He represented a clerical class that is fast passing away.

Besides the widow the deceased is survived by two sons, Dr George Mc-Diarmid, of New Orleans, and Archibald a lawver in Chicago, also two daughters, Miss Katie, of New York, Miss Jean, at home. He is also survived by a twin brother at Ottawa,

The funeral, which took place on Monday, Feb. 5, was largely attended. The Rev. J. C. Telmie, pastor of St Andrew's Church, Windsor, conducted the services and was ably assisted by several members of the Chatham presbyterv and also the Rey Mascus Scott, The Rev Dr J. Frazer Smith, of Com-

ber, as a former member of the Dornoch congregation, and also a member for many years of Mr McDiarmid's Bible class was asked to deliver the address. The text chosen for the occasion was 2 Tim; 4; 7-8. "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith: Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, shall give me at that day; and not to me only, but unto all them also that love his appearing."
