Artemesia Council.

Artemesia Council met in the township Hall, Flamborough, on Saturday last, March 3. Members all present, the Reeve in the chair. Minutes of last session were read and confirmed. Communications as follows were read: Georgian Bay Power Co., re bylaw closing certain streets in Engenia; G. F. McDonald et al, petition re the appointment of overseer in Engenia. Bylaws Nos. 665, to close parts of Alma and West streets, Engenia: 666 to appoint township officers, 667, to appoint road commissioners, and 668, to appoint clerk, were introduced and read a first time.

McKenzie—But That the clerk's certificate intimating that a majority of the electors voting had approved of Bylaw No 668, to prohibit the retail sale of intoxicating liquors in this municipality be received, and that the said Bylaw now be read a third time, signed, sealed and entered in Bylaw book.—Carried.

Bylaw 668 was read a third time accordingly.

Best—Whyte That Bylaws 665, 666, 667 and 668 be now read a second time.—Carried.

The above bylaws, with the exception of 668, which was held over until next meeting, were read a third time.

Best—McKenzie That the account of Daniel Leach for moving grader in 1905, \$1, and also \$1 for the bringing grader to town hall this year be paid.—Carried.

McKenzie—McLoughry That the clerk is hereby instructed to solicit quotations from various manufacturers of road plows.—Carried.

McLoughry—Best That Luke Bowers be paid \$15 for five cords of wood for hall.—Carried.

McLoughry—McKenzie That Thos R. Lever be paid \$60 in full settlement for work on Elliott's bridge and hauling cement pipes, the work having been performed in 1905, and the above amount being recommended by the Reeve of last year as a fair proportion of contract price.—Carried.

McKenzie—Whyte That \$1140 be appropriated to be expended on public highways of this municipality this year as follows: Div 1, \$275; Div 2, \$275; Div 3, \$315; Div 4, \$275, this to include expenditures on town lines except opening new parts, and bridges costing over \$20 and that no further grants be made except by resolution of this council, and that the commissioners report to this council before any commission is paid.—Carried.

Council adjourned.

"Value of an education figured in dollars and cents." Boys who get tired of going to school should read the following written by Capt. Adams of Fayette, Ohio, college: The average educated man gets a salary of \$1,000 per year. He works forty years making a total of \$40,000 in a lifetime. The average day laborer gets \$1.25 per day—300 days in the year or \$375 in a year. In 40 years, he earns \$15,000. The difference, or \$25,000, equals the value of an education. To acquire this earning capacity requires twelve years at school of 180 days each or 2,160 days. Divide \$25,000 the value of education, by 2,160, number of days in getting it, we find that each day at school is worth a little more than \$10.00 to a pupil. Can't afford to miss it. Can we?—Wisconsin Journal of Education.

MONEY IN HOES.—Mr John Clark, of Eden road south delivered a bunch of nine hogs on Tuesday to Mr F. Kelly, Eden Grove, that weighed 2,700 lbs, or an average of 295 lbs each. The hogs were a week less than six months old. Mr Clark received for them \$184. This is the third litter from the same sow, all sold within one year for a total of \$580, and this does not include two fat hogs kept for home use, and a pair sold when weaned, which would make the total about \$400. Mr Clark evidently has the hog raising and feeding business down a fine science. He tells us that in feeding chopped grain of any kind his plan is to let the pigs eat the dry meal, and then give them water afterwards, instead of feeding it mixed with water.—Paisley Advocate.

The Hon. A. J. Matheson, Provincial Treasurer, is able to announce at the close of the first year's administration of the new government, a surplus of \$620,150.03. This is very satisfactory and the Tory newspapers are making a great jubilation over it, and yet as a matter of fact all the credit should go to the late Liberal government. In looking over the various items of revenue, we find that the sum of \$445,088 was received from the Supplementary Revenue Act and the sum of \$684,178 from the Succession Duties Act. If we add these two items together it will give us \$1,129,266. If we take this amount from the total income, Mr Matheson instead of having a surplus of \$620,000 would have a deficit of a little over half a million dollars. Now it is very well known that Mr Whitney bitterly denounced those two features of the Liberal government's policy and declared time and time again that if he could have his way about it, he would have then abolished. How he must thank his stars to-day that he didn't have his way about it, and how thankful also Mr Matheson, the treasurer, must be.—Ex.
